1. Land to which this declaration applies ("the site")

in the municipality of the City of Holroyd. A map of the site is available for inspection at the offices of the Department of the Environment and Climate Change, Level 15, 59 Goulburn Street, Sydney NSW.

2. Nature of contamination affecting the site:

The EPA has found that the site is contaminated with the following substances ("the contaminants"):

• Chlorinated hydrocarbons (notably Trichloroethene (TCE), Dichloroethene (DCE) and Tetrachloroethene (PCE))

3. Nature of harm that the contaminants may cause:

The EPA has considered the matters in s.12 of the Act and for the following reasons has determined that the land is contaminated and that the contamination is significant enough to warrant regulation under the Act:

- The contaminants have migrated from the land. The substances were identified beneath a stormwater discharge point in a pool of water immediately beyond the boundary of the site.
- Two (2) groundwater plumes of the contaminants have been identified onsite and in close proximity to the boundaries. Concentration of these substances in groundwater exceed the Australian and New Zealand Guidelines for Fresh and Marine Water Quality (ANZECC 2000) trigger levels for the protection of 95% of species, and the recommended screening values for recreational waters in the Australian Government National Health and Medical Research Council Guidelines for Managing Risks in Recreational Water (NHMRC 2008). Based on the geological and hydrogeological conditions, the groundwater plumes are likely to discharge offsite and potentially impact Prospect Creek;
- There is a potential for harm to occur in that the groundwater contamination could degrade the aquatic ecosystem of Prospect Creek and limit its use by the public for recreational purposes.
- There is a potential for contaminants in the groundwater plumes to migrate as vapours into the buildings in the affected area over time. On this basis, onsite workers may be exposed to volatile organic compound vapours inside the buildings.

The making of this declaration does not prevent the carrying out of voluntary management of the site and any person may submit a voluntary management proposal for the site to the EPA. LOCAL COURT PRACTICE NOTE No. 1 OF 2010

Issued: 4 January 2010 Amended: 28 June 2010

Procedures to be Adopted for Committal Hearings in the Local Court for Proceedings Commenced on or after 1 May 2008

THIS Practice Note applies to all matters for which a Court Attendance Notice was filed on or after 1 May 2008 but before 1 January 2011 (irrespective of whether the offence was committed before or after 1 May 2008) and supersedes Practice Notes 1 of 2007 and 4 of 2008 for these matters.

Part A of this Practice Note applies in relation to committal proceedings heard at Downing Centre Local Court and Central Local Court in Sydney. Part B of this Practice Note applies to committal proceedings heard at all other Local Court locations.

This Practice Note does not apply to offences in the Children's Court.

PART A

This Part applies in relation to committal proceedings in respect of indictable offences heard at Downing Centre Local Court and Central Local Court in Sydney, for which a Court Attendance Notice was filed on or after 1 May 2008 but before 1 January 2011 (irrespective of whether the offence was committed before or after 1 May 2008) pursuant to the Criminal Case Conferencing Trial Act 2008.

The procedures outlined in the Practice Note are intended as best practice to ensure Time Standards for cases committed for trial or sentence to the Supreme or District Court are complied with and to enable accused persons who are adults and are legally represented to attend a Compulsory Case Conference (Compulsory Conference) in accordance with the Criminal Case Conferencing Trial Act 2008.

Paragraph 2.2 and all of Item 4 of Part A do not apply in proceedings relating to Commonwealth offences.

The procedures outlined are also intended to ensure that the utilisation of Audio Visual Link technology is conducted in the most efficient manner.

- 1. Matters where Election to proceed on indictment to be considered pursuant to Criminal Procedure Act
 - 1.1 On first appearance, matters to which Table 1 of the Criminal Procedure Act (CPA) apply will be adjourned for 14 days for determination as to whether an Election is to be made to have the matter dealt with on indictment. No. brief orders are to be made on the first appearance in these circumstances.
 - 1.2 If an Election is made after the fourteen (14) day adjournment, the matter is to proceed in accordance with item 2 of this Practice Note.
 - 1.3 If no Election is made, the matter is to proceed in the same way as any summary proceeding (see Practice Note 7 of 2007).
- 2. Strictly Indictable matters or matters where election made to proceed on indictment 1st Appearance
 - 2.1 On the first appearance date, a brief order must be made by the Court.
 - 2.2 The Court will give the accused person a statement in writing explaining the effect of Part 3 of the Criminal Case Conferencing Trial Act 2008 (see Attachment A).
 - 2.3 The brief order will depend on the nature of the evidence to be included in the brief and will be either:
 - (a) a brief service order (see 2.4-2.6 below), or
 - (b) an extended brief service order (see 2.7-2.11 below).
- Brief Service Order
 - 2.4 Where the prosecution does not seek extended brief service orders or the Court is not satisfied that extended brief service orders should be made, the Court will order service of the brief in no less than six weeks.
 - 2.5 The matter will be adjourned to a date no less than one week after the brief service date for review.
 - 2.6 The Prosecuting Authority is to ensure the informant is notified not more than 72 hours after the brief orders are made of the need to prepare a brief for service on an accused person.

Extended Brief Service Order

2.7 An extended brief service order will generally only be made when the Court is informed that the Prosecuting Authority intends to rely on evidence drug analysis, DNA or fingerprints or where the Court is informed that other evidence is required that justifies the making of an extended brief service order¹.

- 2.8 The Court may make extended brief service orders if it is satisfied that the brief is to include evidence that cannot be obtained within six weeks.
- 2.9 If the prosecution seeks extended brief service orders, it must advise the Court of the categories of evidence that cannot be obtained within six weeks and the date the evidence is expected to be obtained.
- 2.10 If the Court is satisfied that extended brief service orders should be made the Court will order:
 - (a) the brief, excluding the evidence referred to in paragraph 2.9 above, be served in no less than six weeks (the brief service date)
 - (b) the brief, including the evidence referred to in paragraph 2.9 above, be served in no less than twelve weeks or such time as is necessary for the prosecution to obtain that evidence (the further evidence date)
 - (c) the matter be adjourned to a date no less than one week after the further evidence date ordered in under paragraph 2.10 (b).
 - (d) The Prosecuting Authority is to ensure the informant is notified not more than 72 hours after the extended brief service orders are made of the need to prepare a brief for service on an accused person.
- 2.11 Either party may seek leave to restore the matter to the list on giving at least three days notice in writing to the other party/parties and the Court.
- 3. Case Management at the 2nd appearance where brief served and accused not legally represented or charged with a Commonwealth offence
 - 3.1 The accused must be at Court on this date. If in custody, the accused must appear by AVL unless the Court otherwise directs.
 - 3.2 The following directions apply only where the accused is not represented by a barrister or solicitor or is charged with a Commonwealth offence.

The Court may proceed with:

- (a) a committal for sentence or hearing of a plea of guilty where an election to proceed on indictment is withdrawn; or
- (b) the hearing of committal proceedings either by paper committal or waiver; or
- (c) the setting down for hearing of a contested s 91 CPA application or an application to which s 93 CPA (special reasons) applies at the earliest available opportunity. The Court may order that any submissions by the accused in support of an application for a direction under s 91 CPA or s 93 CPA be served on the DPP and filed with the Court at least seven days before the application is to be heard; or
- (d) the hearing of a contested s 91 CPA application or s 93 CPA application; or
- (e) the setting down of the proceedings for committal hearing.

¹ Such evidence may include medical evidence, telephone intercepts or listening device transcripts, translations, computer analysis evidence, business record affidavits and/or evidence from overseas.

- 3.3 The Court may make such further orders as it thinks fit.
- 3.4 Where proceedings under this section are further adjourned, the Court may order that a Disclosure Certificate be served on the accused within two weeks of this date.
- 4. Case Management at the 2nd appearance where brief served and accused is legally represented

Where an adult accused is legally represented by a barrister or a solicitor and a plea of guilty has not been entered for an offence other than an offence mentioned in section 6 (1) of the Criminal Case Conferencing Act 2008, a Compulsory Conference is to be held.

The following practice directions are to apply:

- 4.1 A Compulsory Conference must be held in accordance with Part 3 of the Criminal Case Conferencing Trial Act 2008.
- 4.2 The Court will:
 - (a) Order that the prosecution pursuant to section
 9 of the Criminal Case Conferencing Trial Act
 2008 serve on the accused, within twentyeight (28) days, a Pre-Conference Disclosure Certificate in relation to the offence.
 - (b) Order that a Compulsory Conference be held within forty-two (42) days unless compelling circumstances exist in the interests of justice for a later date.
 - (c) Order that in the event of agreement between the parties as to a plea of guilty at any time the parties have liberty to restore the matter to the list.
 - (d) Order that in the event of agreement not being reached at a Compulsory Conference, any submissions by the accused in support of an application for a direction under s 91 or s 93 CPA are to be in writing, served on the DPP and filed with the Court not more that seven (7) days after a Compulsory Conference.
 - (e) Order that the DPP to respond within seven (7) days of being served with those submissions.
 - (f) Adjourn the proceedings for a period not more than eight weeks or for such time as the Court considers appropriate in the interests of justice, (the Adjournment Date) when the Pre-Conference Disclosure Certificate and Compulsory Conference certificate will be filed with the Local Court.
- 4.3 Failure to comply with orders under 4.2 (d) and (e) may result in the Court refusing to make a second or subsequent order without cause being shown. In such case the matter may proceed by way of paper committal, with or without submissions.
- 4.4 Where a Court makes a second or subsequent order, it may consider an order for costs against the defaulting party in accordance with section 118 of the Criminal Procedure Act 1986.
- 4.5 This item does not apply where an accused is charged with a Commonwealth offence.
- 5. Case management on the Adjournment Date

Failure by the accused or the accused's legal representative to attend at a Compulsory Conference will not entitle the

accused to an adjournment unless compelling circumstances exist in the interests of justice.

- 5.1 On the adjournment date, the Court may proceed with:
 - (a) a committal for sentence or hearing of a plea of guilty where an election to proceed on indictment is withdrawn; or
 - (b) the hearing of committal proceedings either by paper committal or waiver; or
 - (c) the setting down for hearing of a contested s 91 CPA application or an application to which s 93 CPA (special reasons) applies at the earliest available opportunity. The Court may order that any submissions by the accused in support of an application for a direction under s 91 CPA or s 93 CPA be served on the DPP and filed with the Court at least seven days before the application is to be heard; or
 - (d) the hearing of a contested s 91 CPA application or s 93 CPA application; or
 - (e) the setting down of the committal proceedings for hearing.
- 5.2 The Court may make such further orders as it thinks fit.
- 6. Listing of committal proceedings for hearing in the Local Court

Subject to the interests of justice, committal proceedings are to be completed as expeditiously as possible to enable the transfer, if appropriate, of these cases to either the Supreme or District Court.

7. Adjournments

No variations of the above procedural timetable will be granted unless compelling circumstances exist in the interests of justice.

Criminal Case Processing - A

Process of Matters Through the Local Court at Downing Centre and Central – Except Where Accused is Unrepresented or is Charged with a Commonwealth Offence

First Appearance

If matter is Table 1

- Matter adjourned for not less than 14 days for Election to be made.
- No brief service orders made.

If Strictly Indictable or election made

- Brief service orders or extended brief service orders made
- Explanation of Compulsory Case Conference
- Adjourned for not less than 7 weeks for service of the brief for review.
- Where extended brief service orders made, brief service in not less that six weeks, further evidence service in no less than 12 weeks or further period as required and matter adjourned until one week after further evidence date for review.

Second Appearance²

Accused must participate in a conference³

Matter adjourned for eight weeks:

- Disclosure Certificate to be served within 28 days
- Conference within 42 days of second appearance.
- Liberty to restore to list if plea negotiated.
- If not negotiated, defence to serve 91/93 application submissions on DPP within 7 days after conference.
- DPP to reply 7 days after that.

Third Appearance

Disclosure Certificate and Compulsory Conference certificate filed.

Matter proceeds in Local Court or as Paper Committal for Sentence or Trial or 91/93 Application determined by the Court:

- If granted: matter adjourned for Committal Hearing
- If refused: matter proceeds as Paper Committal for Trial

Fourth Appearance: Committal Hearing

Only applies where the Court has made orders under sections 91 or 93.

Notes

• DPP Disclosure Certificate to be served in all matters where accused is participating in the case conference.

PART B

This Part applies in relation to committal proceedings in respect of indictable offences heard at Local Courts other than the Downing Centre and Central Local Courts, for which a court attendance notice was filed on or after 1 May 2008 but before 1 January 2011 (irrespective of whether the offence was committed before or after 1 May 2008).

The procedures outlined in the Practice Note are intended as best practice to ensure that Time Standards for cases committed for trial or sentence to the Supreme or District Court, are as far as possible complied with and to enable accused persons who are adults and are legally represented to attend a Case Conference (Conference).

Item 4 of Part B does not apply in proceedings relating to Commonwealth offences.

The procedures outlined are also intended to ensure that the utilisation of Audio Visual Link technology is conducted in the most efficient manner.

- 1. Matters where Election to proceed on indictment to be considered pursuant to Criminal Procedure Act
 - 1.1 On first appearance, to which Table 1 of the CPA applies matters will be adjourned for 14 days for determination of whether an Election is to be made to have the matter dealt with on indictment. No. brief orders are to be made on the first appearance in these circumstances.
 - 1.2 If an Election is made after the fourteen (14) day adjournment, the matter is to proceed in accordance with item 2 of this Practice Note.
 - 1.3 If no Election is made, the matter is to proceed in the same way as any summary proceeding (see Practice Note 7 of 2007).

- 2. Strictly Indictable Matters or matters where election made to proceed on indictment 1st Appearance
 - 2.1 On the first appearance date a brief order must be made by the Court.
 - 2.2 The Court will order service of the brief in no less than six weeks.
 - 2.3 The matter will be adjourned to a date no less than one week after the brief service date for review.
 - 2.4 The Prosecuting Authority is to ensure the informant is notified not more than 72 hours after the brief orders are made of the need to prepare a brief for service on an accused person.
- 3. Case Management at the 2nd appearance where brief served and accused is not legally represented or charged with a Commonwealth offence
 - 3.1 The accused must be at Court on this date. If in custody, the accused must appear by AVL unless the Court otherwise directs.
 - 3.2 The Court may proceed with:
 - (a) a committal for sentence or hearing of a plea of guilty where an election to proceed on indictment is withdrawn; or
 - (b) the hearing of committal proceedings either by paper committal or waiver; or
 - (c) the setting down for hearing of a contested s 91 CPA application or an application to which s 93 CPA (special reasons) applies at the earliest available opportunity. The Court may order that any submissions by the accused in support of an application for a direction under s 91 CPA or s 93 CPA be served on the DPP and filed with the Court at least seven days before the application is to be heard; or
 - (d) the hearing of a contested s 91 CPA application or s 93 CPA application; or
 - (e) the setting down of committal proceedings for hearing.
 - 3.3 The Court may make such further orders at it thinks fit.
- 4. Case Management at the 2nd appearance where brief served and accused is legally represented
 - 4.1 The following practice directions are to apply only where an adult accused is legally represented by a barrister or a solicitor and a plea of guilty has not been entered:
 - (a) the legal representative of the accused must inform the Court whether a legal representative of the accused will attend a Conference. Where an accused will not attend a Conference the Court will proceed in accordance with Paragraph 3 above.
 - (b) Upon being informed that the legal representative of the accused will attend a Conference the Court will:
 - (i) Order that a Conference be held within forty-two (42) days unless compelling circumstances exist in the interests of justice for a later date.
 - (ii) Order that in the event of agreement between the parties as to a plea of guilty at

² Assumes brief served – otherwise, further brief service orders to be made ³ Assumes accused legally represented – otherwise paragraph 3 applies

any time the parties have liberty to restore the matter to the list.

- (iii) Order that in the event of agreement not being reached at a Conference, any submissions by the accused in support of an application for a direction under s 91 or s 93 CPA are to be in writing, served on the DPP and filed with the Court not more that seven (7) days after a Conference.
- (iv) The DPP to respond within seven (7) days of being served with those submissions
- (v) Adjourn the proceedings for a period not more than eight weeks or for such time as the Court considers appropriate in the interests of justice (the adjournment date).
- 4.2 The committal hearing will not be adjourned to another date to allow such a Conference to be held.
- 4.3 Failure to comply with orders under 4.1(b)(iii) and (iv) may result in the Court refusing to make a second or subsequent order without cause being shown. In such case the matter may proceed by way of paper committal, with or without submissions.
- 4.4 Where a Court makes a second or subsequent order, it may consider an order for costs against the defaulting party in accordance with section 118 of the Criminal Procedure Act 1986.
- 4.5 This item does not apply where the accused is charged with a Commonwealth offence.
- 5. Case management on the adjournment date

Failure by the accused or the accused's legal representative to attend at a Conference will not entitle the accused to an adjournment unless compelling circumstances exist in the interests of justice.

- 5.1 On the adjournment date, the Court may proceed with:
 - (a) a committal for sentence or hearing of a plea of guilty where an election to proceed on indictment is withdrawn; or
 - (b) the hearing of committal proceedings either by paper committal or waiver; or
 - (c) the setting down for hearing of a contested s 91 CPA application or an application to which s 93 CPA (special reasons) applies at the earliest available opportunity. The Court may order that any submissions by the accused in support of an application for a direction under s 91 CPA or s 93 CPA be served on the DPP and filed with the Court at least seven days before the application is to be heard; or
 - (d) the hearing of a contested s 91 CPA application or s 93 CPA application; or
 - (e) the setting down of the committal proceedings for hearing.
- 5.2 The Court may make such further orders as it thinks fit.
- 6. Listing of committal proceedings for hearing in the Local Court

Subject to the interests of justice, committal proceedings are to be completed as expeditiously as possible to enable the transfer, if appropriate, of these cases to either the Supreme or District Court.

7. Adjournments

No variations of the above procedural timetable will be granted unless compelling circumstances exist in the interests of justice.

- Adjourned for not less than 7 weeks for review

Second Appearance 1 – does not apply to Commonwealth matters or unrepresented parties

If accused informs court they are not participating in a conference² then usual committal proceedings continue.

If accused is participating, matter adjourned for eight weeks:

- Conference within 28 days of second appearance.
- Liberty to restore to list if plea negotiated
- If not negotiated, defence to serve 91/93 application submissions on DPP within 7 days after conference
- DPP to reply 7 days after that

Third Appearance

Matter proceeds in Local Court or as Paper Committal for Sentence or Trial or 91/93 Application determined by the Court:

- If granted: matter adjourned for Committal Hearing

CRIMINAL CASE CONFERENCING

Statement of Effect of Legislation and Accused Person's Rights

Section 10 (2) Criminal Case Conferencing Trial Act 2008

To the Defendant:

Statement

Compulsory conferences

A compulsory conference is to be held in relation to the offence with which you have been charged.

¹ Assumes brief served – otherwise, further brief service orders to be made ² Or accused is not legally represented, paragraph 3 applies

Purpose of compulsory conference

The purpose of the compulsory conference is to determine whether there is any offence or are any offences to which you are prepared to plead guilty and whether you and the prosecution can reach agreement on certain other matters, such as the details of the agreed facts and facts in dispute in relation to any offence to which you have offered to plead guilty.

Who must attend the compulsory conference

Your legal representative and an officer from the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions representing the prosecution are to attend the compulsory conference.

Documents to be provided to your legal representative

The prosecution must give a brief of evidence and then a pre-conference disclosure certificate to your legal representative before the holding of the compulsory conference. Those documents will outline the offence or offences with which you have been charged and the prosecution's case in relation to those offences.

Holding of compulsory conference

If you don't plead guilty, the pre-conference disclosure certificate will then be filed and the compulsory conference will be held.

If you plead guilty before the filing of the pre-conference disclosure certificate, the compulsory conference will not be held.

Outcome of compulsory conference

The prosecution and your legal representative will sign a compulsory conference certificate after the holding of the compulsory conference and that document will be filed with the court. The certificate will set out the offence or offences with which you have been charged and other matters arising from the compulsory conference, such as whether you offered to plead guilty to any offences and whether you or the prosecution rejected any such offers. It may also include whether you consider the brief of evidence to have been inadequate.

The compulsory conference certificate can only be used by a sentencing court for limited purposes.

Disclosing any information in a compulsory conference does not count as a pre-trial disclosure for the purposes of any additional sentence discounts.

Sentence discounts

Maximum sentence discount for guilty plea before committal for trial

If you plead guilty before being committed for trial, you are entitled to a 25% discount on your sentence for the guilty plea.

Maximum sentence discount for guilty plea after committal for trial

If you plead guilty at any time after being committed for trial, a court may discount your sentence by up to 12.5% for the guilty plea depending on how much of a benefit will result from you pleading guilty at that stage of the proceedings. If the court considers there is no benefit gained from the guilty plea at that stage, no discount for the guilty plea will be allowed.

In certain exceptional circumstances, you may be allowed a sentence discount of up to 25%.

Prosecutor may exclude offences

The prosecution may exclude any offence from the operation of the sentence discounting provisions by a notice in writing filed with the court at the same time as the preconference disclosure certificate. The prosecution can only exclude an offence if the prosecutor is satisfied that the case in question is an extreme case and there is a high probability of conviction.

LOCAL COURT PRACTICE NOTE No. 3 OF 2010

Pre-judgment Interest Rates

Commencement

1. This Practice Note was issued on 25 June 2010 and commences on 1 July 2010.

Application

2. This Practice Note applies to new and existing civil proceedings in the Court.

Introduction

3. The purpose of this Practice Note is to set the rate of pre-judgment interest that may be awarded under section 100 (1) and (2) of the Civil Procedure Act 2005.

Calculating pre-judgment interest

- 4. Section 100 of the Civil Procedure Act 2005 provides for the making of orders for the inclusion of interest in judgments.
- 5. Practitioners and litigants should expect that where, pursuant to section 100 (1) and (2) of the Civil Procedure Act 2005, interest in respect of a pre-judgment period is to be included in a judgment, the Court will have regard to the following rates, being rates agreed upon by the Discount and Interest Rate Harmonisation Committee established following a referral by the Council of Chief Justices:
 - (a) in respect of the period from 1 January to 30 June in any year – the rate that is 4% above the cash rate last published by the Reserve Bank of Australia before that period commenced, and
 - (b) in respect of the period from 1 July to 31 December in any year – the rate that is 4% above the cash rate last published by the Reserve Bank of Australia before that period commenced.

PRACTICE NOTE SC EQ 2

Supreme Court Equity Division - Admiralty List

Commencement

1. This Practice Note was issued on 25 June 2010 and commences on 1 August 2010.

Application

2. This Practice Note applies to proceedings in or to be entered in, the Admiralty List in the Equity Division of the Supreme Court.

Definitions

- 3. In this Practice Note:
 - Act means the Admiralty Act 1988 (Cth)

List means the Admiralty List

List Judge means the judge of the Equity Division assigned to administer the Admiralty List

Rules means the Admiralty Rules 1988 (Cth)

SCR means the Supreme Court Rules 1970

UCPR means the Uniform Civil Procedure Rules 2005

Introduction

4. The Purpose of this Practice Note is to set out the matters which must be assigned to the List, the mode of entry in, and removal from, the List, and the case management procedure which will be employed in the List with the aim of achieving the just, quick and cheap disposal of proceedings.

Assignment of business and entry in the Admiralty List

- 5. The Court will assign proceedings to the Equity Division and enter them in the List if the matter concerns or involves jurisdiction of the Court under, any of:
 - (1) the Admiralty Act 1988 (Cth)
 - (2) the Limitation of Liability for Maritime Claims Act 1989 (Cth)
 - (3) the Shipping Registration Act 1981 (Cth)
 - (4) the Navigation Act 1912 (Cth)
 - (5) the Marine Insurance Act 1909 (Cth) or equivalent legislation

Entry in the List on commencement of proceedings

- 6. Where a plaintiff, on his or her Summons or Statement of Claim filed in the Equity Division, adds "Admiralty List" next under the heading and title, the proceedings shall be entered in the List without any order for entry.
- 6A. Where a plaintiff commences proceedings by way of a Writ in rem, the Writ shall have the words "Admiralty List" in its heading and be entered in the List.
- 7. A document filed in the Court in the List must be entitled as required in Form 1 of the Rules and must otherwise comply with the forms prescribed by the Rules and the UCPR.
- 8. All matters in the List are case managed from commencement by the List Judge. A plaintiff commencing proceedings in the List should contact the Associate to the List Judge prior to filing the initiating process to request a date for the proceedings to be listed for directions. That date will then be inserted as the return date in the Summons, Statement of Claim or Writ in rem upon filing in the Registry.

Entry into and removal from the List

9. The Court may, on the application of a party or of its own motion, if it is satisfied that it is proper to do so, order that proceedings be entered in or removed from the List and may give such further directions as to the continuance of the proceedings as it thinks fit.

Directions and applications

- 10. Directions hearings and applications by Notice of Motion are heard by the List Judge at 9.30am on Thursday.
- 11. Representatives of parties attending directions hearings are expected to be sufficiently informed of the nature of the case and its current position to enable the List Judge to deal with the matter expeditiously and with minimum expense to the parties.

- 12. Directions for timetables and other orders or directions which have been agreed between the parties may be made without the parties' attendance in Court by sending to the Associate to the List Judge by email or facsimile Short Minutes of Order signed by the legal representatives of all parties at least two days before the dated fixed for directions.
- 13. A party may at any time, and notwithstanding any earlier direction, arrange for a matter to be listed for directions by contacting the Associate to the List Judge.
- 14. A party wishing to make an urgent application during business hours should contact the Associate to the List Judge to arrange a time for the matter to be listed.
- 15. A party wishing to make an urgent application outside normal business hours should apply to the Equity Duty Judge, who will, if possible, refer the matter to the List Judge, but otherwise deal with the application.
- 16. The Court's expectations of the parties to proceedings in the List and of the legal practitioners appearing in the List include that:
 - (1) careful review of the case will be made as early as practicable for the purpose of informing the Court of its suitability for mediation, for reference out of all or some of the issues, for the use of a single expert or a Court Appointed Expert or for the use of an appropriate concurrent evidence process;
 - (2) agreement will be reached on a timetable for the preparation of matters for trial and/or reference and/or mediation, and Consent Orders will be handed up during the directions hearing;
 - (3) if there is slippage in an agreed timetable, further agreement will be reached without the need for the intervention of the Court; and
 - (4) requests for Court intervention in relation to timetabling will only be sought rarely when, for good reason, agreement has proved to be impossible.
- 17. Once proceedings have been commenced, the parties to proceedings in the List and the legal practitioners appearing in the List are to consider:
 - (1) what steps (including the making of offers) have been or should be, taken to settle or mediate the matter;
 - (2) whether at an early stage, the dispute or some part or parts of the dispute should be referred to a referee pursuant to Part 20 rule 13 of the UCPR; and
 - (3) whether, having regard to the nature of the case, the amount involved and the issues, the matter ought to be listed for an extended directions hearing at which proposals for speedy determination can be canvassed

and, where appropriate and after discussions with the other parties, re-list the matter for directions.

Cargo claims

18. At an early stage in cargo claim proceedings, the parties to proceedings in the List and the legal practitioners appearing in the List are to address at least the following matters, with the aim of defining or eliminating issues and avoiding dispute about pleadings:

- 2 July 2010
 - (1) the identification of the relevant bill of lading or sea carriage document or other transport document;
 - (2) the identity of the carrier or carriers, contractual and actual, and the nature of any dispute about that;
 - (3) if the party said to be the actual carrier is different from the contractual carrier, the terms under which the actual carriage is said to have been performed;
 - (4) if the goods were containerised, whether the container was packed or stuffed by or on behalf of the shipper or other cargo interest or by or on behalf of the carrier;
 - (5) the description of the goods in the bill of lading or sea carriage document or other transport document;
 - (6) the legal regime said to govern the carriage: which national law and through it or otherwise, which convention or regime applies;
 - (7) whether any limitation of liability or time bar argument arises or may arise;
 - (8) the causes of action relied upon against each defendant;
 - (9) provision of proper particulars of:
 - (a) any claims; and
 - (b) any defences;
 - (10) if title to sue is in issue, the facts said to give rise to the title to sue under the relevant convention, legislation or otherwise;
 - (11) the nature of the damage and the detailed breakdown of the claim; and
 - (12) the provision at an early stage of documents and other information relevant to the claim and/or the defence of the claim which the other party does not hold.

Hearings

- 19. List matters will be fixed for hearing only by the List Judge and, in so far as is possible, will be given priority in the Court's calendar.
- 20. Parties should be prepared to take an early date for a final hearing and will be encouraged to streamline the issues for trial.
- 21. Prior to the matter being set down for hearing, the parties, by their legal representatives, are to advise the Court as to their respective positions in respect of:
 - (1) whether the matter ought to be referred to mediation;
 - (2) whether the dispute or some part or parts of the dispute, should be referred to a referee pursuant to Part 20 rule 14 of the UCPR or to a court-appointed expert pursuant to Part 31 rule 46 of the UCPR;
 - (3) whether the Usual Order for Hearing (Annexure A to Practice Note No. SC Eq 1) should be made in respect of expert evidence; and
 - (4) whether any issues are suitable for a separate determination in accordance with Part 28 of the UCPR.

- 22. At the time application is made for a hearing date, each party is to advise the Court:
 - whether it will apply to have resort to section 190
 of the Evidence Act 1995;
 - (2) whether there will be any need for videolink evidence and any perceived problems relating to the taking of such evidence;
 - (3) the number of witnesses to be called by each party and whether any of the witnesses will require the assistance of an interpreter;
 - (4) whether any particular issues as to admissibility of evidence are envisaged to require determination at trial; and
 - (5) the length of time that the case is anticipated to take, having regard to the number of witnesses, the need for videolink evidence, the need for interpreters, and with due allowance for openings and submissions and any evidentiary or other issues expected to affect the length of the hearing.
- 23. The Usual Order for Hearing in Annexure A to Practice Note No. SC Eq 1 will apply to a matter set down for hearing in the List, unless some other order is made by the List Judge.

Registrar and Marshal

- 24. The officer of the Court authorised to be Registrar for the purposes of Rule 4 (1) of the Rules is the Registrar in Equity.
- 25. The Chief Justice appoints an appropriate officer of the Court to the position of Marshal. The contact details for the current Marshal are available from the Court's website (www.lawlink.nsw.gov.au/sc).

Insurance of property arrested under the Admiralty Act 1988

- 26. The Act provides for the arrest of property (including vessels) by the Marshal in actions in rem. The Marshal does not at any time during the period of arrest hold commercial insurance for the benefit of any person who has an interest in arrested property.
- 27. Persons with an interest in arrested property and their solicitors may wish to consider the question of insuring the amount of their interest against consequential risks, including risks occasioned by any movement of a vessel.

AMENDMENT TO THE LEGAL PROFESSION ADMISSION RULES 2005

AMEND rule 16 (2) by deleting the word "two" and inserting the word

"three" between the words "to" and "further".

The amended rule reads as follows:

16 (2) The Legal Qualifications Committee may, by co-option, appoint up to three further members being persons who are or have been Judges, Barristers, Solicitors, Legal Practitioners, Lawyers, Professors of Law or full-time Law Lecturers.

PASSENGER TRANSPORT ACT 1990

Section 60A

Determination of Fares for Taxi-cabs: 2010

I, Les Wileinga, Director-General of Transport NSW, pursuant to s60A of the Passenger Transport Act 1990, hereby determine that the maximum fares and other arrangements for remuneration payable by the hirers in respect of taxi-cab services in New South Wales shall be as set out hereunder.

1. Interpretation

Terms used, other than those defined hereunder, have the same meaning as they do in the Passenger Transport Act 1990 or Passenger Transport Regulation 2007.

- *Country Area*' means that part of New South Wales other than an Urban Area and an Exempt Area.
- *Exempt Area*' means the townships of Moama, Barham, Tocumwal, Mulwala, Barooga and Deniliquin.
- *Holiday Surcharge*' means an amount equal to 20% of the Distance Rate, as set out in clause 4, in respect of a journey commencing between 6am and 10pm on a Sunday or Public Holiday.
- *Night-time Surcharge'* means an amount equal to 20% of the Distance Rate, as set out in clauses 3 and 4 (as the case may be), in respect of a journey commencing between 10pm and 6am.
- 'Public Holiday' means a day specified in the Fourth Schedule of the Banks and Bank Holidays Act 1912 or as proclaimed as a public holiday in the Gazette, but does not include a day observed solely as a bank holiday.
- *'Tolls'* mean all road, bridge, ferry, tunnel and airport tolls that apply to a journey and, in respect of a northbound journey over the Sydney Harbour Bridge or through the Sydney Harbour Tunnel, mean an amount equal to the toll applicable to southbound traffic at the time of the hirer's northbound journey.
- 'Urban Area' means those parts of New South Wales specified in Schedule 1.

2. Commencement

This determination takes effect from Monday 12th July 2010.

3. Maximum Fares in an Urban Area

The maximum fares and other arrangements payable in relation to a taxi-cab licensed to operate in an Urban Area as set out in this clause.

Flag Fall:	\$3.30
Distance Rate:	\$1.99 per kilometre
Booking Fee:	\$2.20
Waiting Time:	\$51.51 per hour (85.8 cents per minute) while vehicle speed is less than 26 km/h

4. Maximum Fares in a Country Area

The maximum fares and other arrangements payable in relation to a taxi-cab licensed to operate in a Country Area are as set out in this clause.

Flag Fall:	\$3.80
Distance Rate:	\$2.04 per kilometre for the first 12 kilometres and \$2.83 per kilometre thereafter
Booking Fee:	\$1.10
Waiting Time:	\$52.40 per hour (87.3 cents per minute) while vehicle speed is less than 26 km/h

5. Night-time Surcharge

A Night-time Surcharge on the Distance Rate is payable in relation to a taxi-cab licensed to operate in either an Urban Area or a Country Area.

6. Tolls

Tolls are payable in relation to a taxi-cab licensed to operate in either an Urban Area or a Country Area.

7. Holiday Surcharge

A Holiday Surcharge on the Distance Rate is payable in relation to a taxi-cab licensed to operate in a Country Area.

8. Maxi-cabs

An amount of up to 150% of the fare and other arrangements payable in accordance with clauses 3, 4, 5 and 7 (as the case may be) excluding tolls, may be demanded by the driver of a maxi-cab licensed to operate in either an Urban Area or a Country Area, provided:

- (a) where the taxi-cab is pre-booked, a maxi-cab is requested; or
- (b) where the maxi-cab is hired from a taxi-zone or street, there are 5 or more passengers.

This clause 8 does not apply:

- (c) in respect of a multiple-hiring; or
- (d) where the maxi-cab is pre-booked for a person using a wheelchair, unless the person has requested a taxicab with seating for more than 5 adult passengers.
- 9. Multiple hirings

An amount of 75% of the fare and other arrangements payable in accordance with clauses 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 (as the case may be) may be demanded by the driver of a taxi-cab licensed to operate in either an Urban Area or a Country Area and payable by each hirer of the taxi-cab provided:

(a) each of the hirers and the driver agree;

- (b) each of the hirers agree that the driver may accept the other hirings;
- (c) all of the hirers commence the hiring of the taxi-cab at the same time; and
- (d) all of the hirers are travelling to destinations in the same general locality or the same general direction.
- 10. Exempt Area

This determination does not apply to a taxi-cab licensed to operate in an Exempt Area.

11. Previous Determinations

All previous determinations made pursuant to s60A of the Passenger Transport Act 1990 in relation to maximum fares for taxi-cabs are revoked.

SUBORDINATE LEGISLATION ACT 1989

Conveyancing (Sale of Land) Regulation 2010

NOTICE is given, in accordance with section 5 of the Subordinate Legislation Act 1989, of the intention to remake a regulation under the Conveyancing Act 1919. The proposed Regulation is the Conveyancing (Sale of Land) Regulation 2010, which will commence on 1 September 2010. It replaces the Conveyancing (Sale of Land) Regulation 2005.

The object of the proposed Regulation is to prescribe, among other things:

- (i) the documents that must be attached to a contract for the sale of, or option to purchase, land before a property can be offered for sale,
- (ii) the terms, conditions and warranties deemed to be included in a contract or option,
- (iii) the classes of land, vendors and contracts that are exempt from the requirements of the Regulation, and
- (iv) the remedies available to a purchaser for breaches of the Regulation.

TRAVEL AGENTS ACT 1986

List of Licensed Travel Agents

SECTION 40 (2) of the Travel Agents Act 1986 requires the Director-General to publish in the Government Gazette from time to time a list of licence holders.

Section 40 (7) of the Act deems the supplier of travel services to an unlisted travel agent to have aided and abetted that person in carrying on business as a travel agent. Thus the supplier could be subject to the same penalty of 500 penalty units as the agent is trading without a licence.

Suppliers of travel services should not deal with an unlisted person or corporation unable to produce a travel agent's licence.

Market Practice Guidelines made under section 91A of the *Home Building Act 1989*

1 July 2010

Market Practice Guidelines

1. Introduction

- (a) These Market Practice Guidelines are made by the Minister administering the Home Building Act 1989 (the Act) under section 91A of the Act with respect to appropriate market practices in connection with the provision of Home Warranty Insurance by or on behalf of the NSW Self Insurance Corporation (the Insurer).
- (b) These Market Practice Guidelines have been made after consultation with the Home Warranty Insurance Scheme Board and with the concurrence of the Minister administering the *NSW Self Insurance Corporation Act 2004*.
- (c) The Insurer is required by the *NSW Self Insurance Corporation Act 2004* to comply with these Market Practice Guidelines in exercising its powers or functions with respect to Home Warranty Insurance.
- (d) The Insurer may appoint an Insurance Agent to exercise or perform the powers and functions of the Insurer to which these Market Practice Guidelines apply and in that case the Insurance Agent must exercise or perform those powers or functions as if it was the Insurer so as to comply with, and so as to cause the Insurer to comply with, these Market Practice Guidelines and the Insurance Agent must comply with clauses 9 to 12.
- (e) An Insurance Intermediary must also comply with these Market Practice Guidelines as set out in clause 10.

2. Defined Terms

- (a) In these Market Practice Guidelines the terms defined in the Act and in the *Home Building Regulation 2004* (the *Regulation*) have the same meaning as they do under the Act or Regulation.
- (b) In these Market Practice Guidelines, unless the contrary intention appears:

Builder means a person who is required by Part 6 of the Act to enter into a contract of Home Warranty Insurance but does not include an Owner-Builder;

Certificate means a certificate of insurance evidencing a contract of Home Warranty Insurance issued by or on behalf of the Insurer;

Eligibility refers to a statement of intent by or on behalf of the Insurer that it is prepared to issue a Certificate on the terms described in subclause 5.1;

Insurance Agent means a person appointed as an agent of the Insurer under subsection 8A(4) of the NSW Self Insurance Corporation Act 2004;

Insurance Intermediary has the same meaning as in section 3 of the NSW Self Insurance Corporation Act 2004;

Premium Rates means the Insurer's standard rates or range of premiums in respect of each category or class of Builder to which, or Owner-Builder work for which, it offers or proposes to offer Home Warranty Insurance or, where there is no standard rates or range of premiums, the

premium determined by the methodology set out in the Underwriting Procedures Manual or as determined by the Insurer;

Note: During the transition period for the new arrangements commencing on 1 July 2010 until the date advised by the Insurer to the Insurance Agents on which its Premium Rates and its Underwriting Procedures Manual first come into effect, an Insurance Agent will use the underwriting guidelines and premiums used by the Insurance Agent in its capacity as an insurer under the Act immediately prior to 1 July 2010.

Underwriting Guidelines means the underwriting guidelines summarising relevant provisions of the Underwriting Procedures Manual approved by the Insurer and issued to the Insurance Agent from time to time; and

Underwriting Procedures Manual means the document setting out the Insurer's underwriting procedures and guidelines (including any variation) last submitted to the Director-General under clause 3 but does not include the Underwriting Guidelines.

3. Underwriting Procedures Manual and Premium Rates

3.1 Submission to Director-General

The Insurer must submit to the Director-General at least 10 Business Days before the intended date of operation, its Underwriting Procedures Manual and Premium Rates in respect of Home Warranty Insurance.

3.2 Alterations to Underwriting Procedures Manual and Premium Rates

The Insurer must submit to the Director-General at least 10 Business Days before the intended date of operation any variation of the Underwriting Procedures Manual or Premium Rates previously submitted to the Director-General.

3.3 Consistency with Market Practice Guidelines

The Insurer's Underwriting Procedures Manual and Premium Rates must be consistent with these Market Practice Guidelines and information provided to the Minister under them. The Insurer must document in its Underwriting Procedures Manual and Premium Rates submitted to the Director-General how each factor identified in subclause 5.2 is given due regard in the establishment of the Underwriting Procedures Manual and Premium Rates.

The Director-General will advise the Insurer if the Director-General is of the opinion that the Insurer's Underwriting Procedures Manual or any part of them are not consistent with these Market Practice Guidelines.

3.4 Additional information

The Insurer must provide with:

- (a) the Premium Rates provided under subclause 3.1 or subclause 3.2, such other information as may be reasonably required by the Director-General;
- (b) the information provided under subclause 3.2, a summary of past claims experience of the Insurer, specifying paid claims and reserves for reported claims.

3.5 Actuarial report required

The information provided under subclauses 3.1, 3.2 or 3.4 in relation to Premium Rates is required to be confirmed by an actuary or to be supported by an actuarial report.

3.6 Additional information and consultation

The Director-General is not required to approve or reject the Insurer's Underwriting Procedures Manual and Premium Rates but the Director-General may request the Insurer to:

- (a) provide additional information in respect of the Underwriting Procedures Manual and Premium Rates to the Director-General; and
- (b) consult with the Director-General, or officers of the Department of Services, Technology & Administration nominated by the Director-General for that purpose, in relation to the Insurer's Underwriting Procedures Manual and Premium Rates.

3.7 Consistent behaviour

The Insurer must:

- (a) consult with the Director-General or nominated officers in relation to any inconsistency in its Underwriting Procedures Manual advised under subclause 3.3 and in relation to any proposed amendments to its Underwriting Procedures Manual;
- (b) ensure that any copy of its Underwriting Procedures Manual and Premium Rates, and any information in respect of these matters, provided to each Insurance Agent is consistent with the Underwriting Procedures Manual and Premium Rates last lodged with the Director-General; and
- (c) underwrite and price Home Warranty Insurance issued by it consistently with the Underwriting Procedures Manual and Premium Rates last submitted to the Director-General.

4. Publication of Information

4.1 Publication

The Insurer must make publicly available (eg, on its internet web site or those of its Insurance Agents) and, if requested by a Builder or an Owner-Builder, provide the following information:

- (a) policy documents for all types of Home Warranty Insurance policies offered;
- (b) standard forms or information the Builder must complete or provide in order to apply for Eligibility (see clause 5) and which the Builder or Owner-Builder must complete or provide in order to apply for a Certificate;
- instructions sufficient to enable the completion of the forms or to enable the provision of information;
- (d) general underwriting criteria;
- (e) after the date advised by the Insurer to the Insurance Agents on which its Premium Rates and its Underwriting Procedures Manual first come into effect, the range of or examples of the premiums that the Insurer proposes to charge sufficient to enable a non-binding indication of the likely cost of a Certificate for typical categories and classes of Builder or Owner-Builder work or, where there is no standard rates or range of premium, the methodology that the Insurer proposes to use to determine the premium;

- (f) details of Insurance Agents' and Insurance Intermediaries' service standards to Builders and Owner-Builders (see clause 7);
- (g) details of the complaints handling process required to be used by Insurance Agents and Insurance Intermediaries including complaints contact persons, phone numbers and email addresses (see clause 12); and
- (h) a list of Insurance Agents that are eligible to distribute Home Warranty Insurance on behalf of the Insurer.

4.2 Supply to Director-General

The Insurer must supply a copy of the information to be provided under subclause 4.1 to the Director-General at least 10 Business Days before it is publicly disclosed.

5. Issuing Home Warranty Insurance

5.1 Effect of Eligibility

A decision by or on behalf of the Insurer to grant Eligibility is not a binding undertaking to insure but is only a statement of intent by or on behalf of the Insurer that it is prepared to issue a Certificate in accordance with the terms and conditions of the grant of Eligibility if the issue of the Certificate is consistent with the requirements of the Underwriting Procedures Manual and these Market Practice Guidelines, unless some other fact or matter has arisen so that under the Underwriting Procedures Manual the Insurer may vary or revoke the grant of Eligibility or not issue the Certificate.

5.2 Requirements for assessment of Eligibility

When assessing a Builder for Eligibility and the rating category and conditions on which the Eligibility is provided, the Insurer must have regard to the following factors:

- (a) unless Eligibility is conditional on a licence being provided by the Director-General, the Builder must have a current licence under the Act at the date of the Eligibility assessment;
- (b) the net tangible assets of the Builder (including assets held by persons or bodies corporate which have granted an acceptable guarantee or indemnity to the Insurer);
- (c) the Builder's net profit position;
- (d) the Builder's annual turnover;
- (e) the Builder's record of association with recent insolvencies and the record of disputes that have judged the Builder or associates to be at fault;
- (f) details of any Eligibility conditions previously imposed by an insurer prior to 1 July 2010; and
- (g) the Builder's claims experience,

but the Insurer is not limited in its assessment to the factors above and may take into account other matters including non-financial matters.

5.3 Decision to issue a Certificate to a Builder

When determining whether or not to issue a Certificate to a Builder, the Insurer must have regard to the following factors:

- (a) the Builder must have a current licence for the work covered by the Certificate on the date on which the Certificate is issued; and
- (b) any facts or circumstances that have arisen which may cause the Insurer to come to the view that issuing a Certificate would cause a detriment to the Insurer.

5.4 Requirements for assessment of Owner-Builders

When assessing an application by an Owner-Builder for Home Warranty Insurance and the premium and conditions on which the Home Warranty Insurance is provided, the Insurer must have regard to the following factors:

- (a) the Owner-Builder work must be performed or have been performed by the holder of an Owner-Builder Permit authorising its holder to do that work;
- (b) the Owner-Builder's record of association with recent insolvencies and record of disputes that have judged the Owner Builder (or his or her associates) to be at fault;
- (c) the Owner-Builder's claims experience; and
- (d) a building inspection report in relation to the Owner-Builder work,

but the Insurer is not limited in its assessment to the factors above and may take into account other matters including non-financial matters.

5.5 Conditions

Any terms or conditions imposed upon a Builder in respect of Eligibility, and any terms or conditions imposed upon an Owner-Builder in respect of Home Warranty Insurance, must be consistent with the Insurer's Underwriting Procedures Manual and Premium Rates provided to the Director-General.

5.6 Guarantees and indemnities

Where the Insurer requires a third party to grant to the Insurer a guarantee, indemnity or undertaking for the purposes of granting or continuing Eligibility or granting a Certificate to a Builder, or for the purposes of issuing a Certificate to an Owner-Builder, the Insurer must clearly inform the Builder or Owner-Builder as to the requirements as to such guarantee, indemnity or undertaking and advise in what circumstances and in what timeframe the guarantee, indemnity or undertaking may be released by the Insurer.

5.7 Duration of Eligibility

- (a) The Insurer must not grant Eligibility for a period greater than two years to any Builder in respect of an annual turnover of \$20 million or more.
- (b) Where a Builder referred to in paragraph 5.7(a) applies for a Certificate more than two years after a grant of Eligibility, the Insurer must re-assess the Builder for Eligibility.

5.8 Notification of Eligibility

 Each quarter, or as otherwise agreed with the Director-General, the Insurer must provide to the Director-General a report of each grant of Eligibility to a Builder during the reporting period, including on any re-assessment under subclause 5.7. (b) The Insurer must immediately notify the Director-General and provide reasons for its decision if it imposes additional limitations or conditions on the terms of Eligibility that it has granted to any Builder with an annual turnover of \$20 million or more.

6. Compliance

The Insurer must treat all applications for Eligibility and for the issue Certificates in a manner consistent with the Insurer's Underwriting Procedures Manual, Premium Rates and with the service standards last lodged with the Director-General.

7. Service

7.1 General duty

The Insurer is required to act with promptness and efficiency in relation to all dealings with Builders and Owner-Builders including the granting or varying of Eligibility and the issuing of Certificates.

7.2 Lodge service standards

The Insurer is required to document the service standards and provide a copy of those standards or any variation of them to the Director-General at least 10 Business Days before the intended date of operation.

Note: Paragraph 4.1(f) requires service standards to be made publicly available.

7.3 Amendment of service standards

The Director-General will advise the Insurer if the Director-General is of the opinion that the service standards are not consistent with these Market Practice Guidelines.

7.4 Content of service standards

The service standards must cover, at least, the response time and general service levels required (including the use of appropriately trained underwriting staff) and the form and the nature of communications (written or oral) to Builders and Owner-Builders including in the following situations:

- (a) where application forms have not been fully completed;
- (b) requests for further information in addition to that provided by the Builder or Owner-Builder on the application forms;
- (c) when all information to assess the Builder's application for Eligibility has been received for granting Eligibility or issuing a Certificate to a Builder or Owner-Builder, the terms or conditions of acceptance or denying acceptance including the level of turnover granted;
- (d) where the Insurer amends the terms and conditions of a Builder's Eligibility; and
- (e) early communication to the Builder or Owner-Builder where the Insurer cannot meet the service standards.

7.5 Cancelling Eligibility

Where the Insurer cancels Eligibility then the Insurer must give to the Builder at least 10 Business Days' notice of that decision together with reasons for the decision in accordance with clause 8.

8. Reasons for Decisions

8.1 Documented reasons

The Insurer must document in writing and provide to Builders and Owner-Builders the reasons for:

- (a) on request of a Builder or Owner-Builder, requiring further information from the Builder or Owner-Builder;
- (b) declining Eligibility, including on a re-assessment under subclause 5.7, or declining applications for a Certificate;
- (c) not providing the level of turnover cover sought by the Builder;
- (d) any special conditions the Builder has to comply with for Eligibility or for the granting of a Certificate;
- (e) amending the terms and conditions of a Builder's Eligibility or revoking Eligibility, including on a re-assessment under subclause 5.7; and
- (f) the requirement of the Builder or Owner-Builder to obtain a guarantee, indemnity or undertaking from any third party other than where the requirement is set out in the general underwriting criteria made publicly available under paragraph 4.1(d).

8.2 Consistency

The reasons must be consistent with the Insurer's Underwriting Procedures Manual and Premium Rates lodged with the Director-General and where appropriate refer to the general underwriting criteria relied upon by the Insurer for the decision.

8.3 Matters not covered by reasons

Where reasons are provided there is no requirement for the Insurer to disclose information:

- (a) provided by third parties that is confidential or that identifies those third parties;
- (b) that may not be disclosed under law;
- (c) that is subject to legal professional privilege; or
- (d) that may prejudice the Insurer or the Insurance Agent in any further investigation or in any dispute in respect of a Home Warranty Insurance claim.

9. Outsourcing

9.1 Outsourcing

If an Insurance Agent arranges for any function of the Insurer to be carried out by another person (the *Provider*) and the Provider (or some other person acting for or providing services to the Provider) collects or holds information or documents that may be required to be produced to the Insurer under the Act or under guidelines made under section 91A of the Act, then:

(a) on request the Insurance Agent must notify the Insurer in writing of the identity of the Provider; and (b) the arrangement between the Insurance Agent and the Provider (or some other person acting for or providing services to the Provider) must oblige the Provider (and that other person or persons) to provide that information or those documents to the Insurer.

9.2 Provider includes Intermediary

For the purposes of this clause 9, a Provider includes an Insurance Intermediary to whom clause 10 applies and any person who the Provider approves or authorises to collect or hold any of the information or documents on its behalf.

10. Dealing with Insurance Intermediaries

10.1 Insurance Intermediaries

Where Home Warranty Insurance is provided through an Insurance Intermediary:

- (a) where an Insurance Intermediary is acting for or providing services to an Insurance Agent the Insurance Intermediary must, in relation to the activities or functions performed by the Insurance Intermediary:
 - comply with these Market Practice Guidelines and the Underwriting Guidelines insofar as they relate to those activities or functions but for this purpose a reference to the Underwriting Guidelines is to be read as a reference to the Underwriting Guidelines last provided to the Insurance Intermediary;
 - (ii) not do anything that may result in the Insurer or the Insurance Agent failing to comply with these Market Practice Guidelines;
 - (iii) immediately notify any complaint that is made to it to the Insurance Agent for whom it acts and fully co-operate in relation to the handling of any complaint made in respect of the Insurance Intermediary by the Insurance Agent and take such steps as it may be required to take by the Insurance Agent to resolve or deal with the complaint; and
 - (iv) meet the service standards, provide the information and do those things required by subclauses 10.3 to 10.7 and as required by clause 12,

and the Insurance Agent must not deal with the Insurance Intermediary in respect of Home Warranty Insurance unless the Insurance Agent and the Insurance Intermediary have entered into an agreement in a form approved by the Insurer and which imposes those obligations on the Insurance Intermediary; or

(b) where an Insurance Intermediary is acting on behalf of a Builder or an Owner-Builder (ie, acting in its capacity as a broker) – the Insurance Intermediary must comply with the requirements of subclauses 10.3 to 10.7 and clause 12 insofar as they relate to the Insurance Intermediary.

10.2 Notification of agreements

Each Insurance Agent must supply a copy of its agreements with each Insurance Intermediary (to the extent that each agreement is different) on request by the Insurer, together with a list of each Insurance Intermediary with which it has an agreement in respect of Home Warranty Insurance.

10.3 Service standards

Each Insurance Intermediary must either:

- (a) meet the service standards specified by the Insurance Agent in accordance with these Market Practice Guidelines insofar as they relate to the Insurance Intermediary's dealings with each Builder or Owner-Builder and the Insurance Agent; or
- (b) meet service standards which are established by the Insurance Intermediary in respect of its dealings with each Builder or Owner-Builder and the Insurance Agent and which are agreed by the Insurance Agent, which service standards satisfy the requirements of clause 7 insofar as they relate to the activities of the Insurance Intermediary.

10.4 Remuneration

The Insurance Intermediary must disclose to each Builder and Owner-Builder all remuneration received by the Insurance Intermediary including:

- (a) the dollar amount of any commission or any fees or allowances the Insurance Agent pays the Insurance Intermediary. Where the dollar amount level of commission is not calculable a description of the nature of the commission and how it is calculated is to be provided (eg, profit commission, override commission); and
- (b) any additional fees or brokerage the Insurance Intermediary charges the Builder or Owner-Builder in addition to the premium.

10.5 Notice of non-compliance

If an Insurance Agent becomes aware of a material failure by an Insurance Intermediary to comply with the terms of the agreement between the Insurance Agent and the Insurance Intermediary, or if the Insurance Agent becomes aware of complaints by Builders or Owner-Builders in respect of the performance of the Insurance Intermediary then the Insurance Agent must require the Insurance Intermediary to rectify the non-performance or to explain the reasons for the complaints or both. If the Insurance Intermediary fails to do this to the reasonable satisfaction of the Insurance Agent, the Insurance Agent must advise the Insurance Intermediary of its non-compliance with the agreement in writing and provide a copy of that notice to the Insurer.

10.6 Information provided to the Director-General

The Insurer may report the non-performance of Insurance Agents or Insurance Intermediaries to the Director-General, and the Director-General may publish information in relation to the performance and non-performance of Insurance Agents or Insurance Intermediaries but such publication will not be made unless or until the Director-General has provided notice to the Insurer, the Insurance Agent and to each Insurance Intermediary likely to be named or affected and has consulted with the Insurer, the Insurance Agent and that Insurance Intermediary in relation to the material to be published.

10.7 Self-assessment

An agreement required under subclause 10.1 must make provision for compliance self-assessment to be conducted in respect of the performance of the Insurance Intermediary by the Insurance Intermediary's internal compliance self-assessment processes or alternatively by the Insurance Agent's external auditor. For this purpose the agreement must reserve a right to the Insurer to appoint a person to conduct an audit of the Insurance Intermediary's compliance with the requirements under the agreement between the Insurance Intermediary and the Insurance Agent.

10.8 Obligations of Insurer

The obligations of the Insurer in relation to the activities of an Insurance Intermediary are to require that each Insurance Agent takes reasonable steps to enforce the agreement between the Insurance Intermediary and the Insurance Agent and if necessary to terminate that agreement. Other than to this extent the Insurer is not liable for the activities of an Insurance Intermediary in circumstances where it would not otherwise be liable for those activities.

11. Self-Assessment and Audit of Insurance Agents

11.1 Compliance self-assessment or audit

Each Insurance Agent must establish a process of internal self-assessment or audit of its compliance with its service standards, these Market Practice Guidelines and other guidelines issued under section 91A of the Act.

11.2 Self-assessment or audit process to be supplied to the Insurer

Each Insurance Agent must provide a detailed summary of the documented self-assessment or audit process and of its results to the Insurer within six weeks after the end of each financial and calendar year ending on the last day of June and December in each year. The Insurer will provide a report to the Director-General on the results of Insurance Agents' self-assessments and audits on a half-yearly basis or as otherwise agreed with the Director-General.

11.3 Audit of Insurance Agents

The Insurer may request that an Insurance Agent engage the Insurance Agent's external auditor or an organisation approved by the Insurer to conduct an external audit of the Insurance Agent's compliance with its agreement with the Insurer and with the Act. The scope of the external audit will be determined by the Insurer and the results of the external audit will be provided to the Insurer.

11.4 Publication

The Director-General may publish a summary of the report of the Insurer referred to in subclause 11.2. Prior to publication of this report the Director-General must provide a copy of the draft report to the Insurer for comment at least 10 Business Days before the date of its proposed publication.

12. Complaints and Disputes

12.1 Internal Dispute Resolution

Each Insurance Agent must establish and maintain an internal complaints handling process for its Home Warranty Insurance business and where an Insurance Agent holds an Australian financial services licence the Insurance Agent must apply its internal complaints handling process to Home Warranty Insurance business conducted by the Insurance Agent.

12.2 Notification

Each Insurance Agent acting on behalf of the Insurer must make details of its complaints handling process publicly available (eg, on its internet web site) and must inform each Builder that applies for Eligibility and each Owner-Builder that applies for Home Warranty Insurance that a complaints handling process exists.

Note: A complaint is to be distinguished from an inquiry. A complaint will only arise for the purposes of this provision where the person making the complaint requests the complaint to be registered or to be referred to the internal dispute handling process of the Insurance Agent. An Insurance Agent that receives a complaint must ask the complainant whether or not that person wishes the complaint to be registered or referred to the internal dispute settlement process.

12.3 Register of complaints

Each Insurance Agent must establish a register of complaints or disputes and on the register record the nature of each complaint or dispute and how and when it was resolved.

12.4 Provision of information to the Insurer and the Director-General

Each Insurance Agent must make available to the Insurer information from each register established under subclause 12.3 in respect of complaints as and when requested. The Insurer will provide a report of this information to the Director-General on a half-yearly basis or as otherwise agreed with the Director-General.

12.5 Publication

The Director-General may publish a summary of the number of complaints and the type of complaints contained on the registers established under subclause 12.3.

13. Data

13.1 Reporting

The Insurer must provide data and information to the Director-General in relation to Home Warranty Insurance policies, claims, premium and other information relating to its Home Warranty Insurance business on a quarterly basis or as otherwise agreed with the Director-General.

13.2 Consultation

The Insurer and the Director-General must consult as to the form and detail of reports to be provided by the Insurer to the Director-General under this clause 13.

13.3 Detailed information

The Director-General may request the Insurer to provide any information in respect of a particular Builder or Owner-Builder, the Certificates issued to that Builder or Owner-Builder and the claims experience under those policies.

13.4 Publication of data by the Director-General

The Director-General may publish a summary of the data obtained from the Insurer pursuant to subclause 13.1. Prior to the publication of this data the Director-General must provide a copy of the summary of the data to the Insurer for comment at least 10 Business Days before the date of its proposed publication.

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Claims Handling Guidelines made under section 91A of the *Home Building Act 1989*

1 July 2010

Claims Handling Guidelines

1. Introduction

- (a) These Claims Handling Guidelines are made by the Minister administering the Home Building Act 1989 (the Act) under section 91A of the Act with respect to appropriate claims handling practices in connection with the provision of Home Warranty Insurance by or on behalf of the NSW Self Insurance Corporation (the Insurer).
- (b) These Claims Handling Guidelines have been made after consultation with the Home Warranty Insurance Scheme Board and with the concurrence of the Minister administering the *NSW Self Insurance Corporation Act 2004*.
- (c) The Insurer is required by the *NSW Self Insurance Corporation Act 2004* to comply with these Claims Handling Guidelines in exercising its powers or functions with respect to Home Warranty Insurance.
- (d) The Insurer may appoint an Insurance Agent to exercise or perform the powers and functions of the Insurer to which these Claims Handling Guidelines apply and in that case the Insurance Agent must exercise or perform those powers or functions as if it was the Insurer so as to comply with, and so as to cause the Insurer to comply with, these Claims Handling Guidelines and the Insurance Agent must comply with clauses 7 and 8.
- (e) A Service Provider must also comply with these Claims Handling Guidelines as set out in clause 7.
- (f) The Claims Handling Guidelines apply to all kinds of insurance to be entered into under Part 6 of the Act.
- (g) The Claims Handling Guidelines apply to all Claims made under contracts of Home Warranty Insurance issued after the date specified by the Minister for the commencement of the operation of the Claims Handling Guidelines.

2. Defined Terms

In these Claims Handling Guidelines:

- (a) the terms defined in the Act, the *Home Building Regulation 2004* (the *Regulation*) have the same meaning as they do under the Act or Regulation;
- (b) subject to subclause 3.6 a reference to the disappearance of a Builder includes a reference to the fact that, after due search and inquiry, the Builder cannot be found;
- (c) a reference to the insolvency of a Builder includes a deemed insolvency as specified in section 99 of the Act; and
- (d) unless the contrary intention appears:

Beneficiary means a person entitled to claim a benefit provided under a contract of Home Warranty Insurance;

Builder means a person who is required by Part 6 of the Act to enter into a contract of Home Warranty Insurance, including an Owner-Builder, and whose work is the subject of a Claim;

Claim means a claim for indemnity by a Beneficiary under a contract of Home Warranty Insurance where the Beneficiary has provided the Prescribed Claim Information to the Insurer;

Claims Procedures Manual means the document setting out the Insurer's claims handling procedures and guidelines (including any variation) last submitted to the Director-General under clause 3;

Insurance Agent means a person appointed as an agent of the Insurer under subsection 8A(4) of the *NSW Self Insurance Corporation Act 2004*;

Prescribed Claim Information means:

- the name, address and telephone number of the Beneficiary and of each owner of the property the subject of the Claim;
- (b) the address of the property the subject of the Claim;
- (c) the name and address and, if known, telephone number of the Builder;
- (d) whether the Beneficiary believes that the Builder has died, disappeared or become insolvent and details of the source of that belief, including all relevant documents obtained by the Beneficiary;
- (e) where the property the subject of the Claim was purchased by the Beneficiary after completion of the work performed by the Builder, a copy of the contract for sale of the property and all attachments;
- (f) where the Beneficiary contracted directly with the Builder:
 - a copy of the contract between the Beneficiary and the Builder in relation to the work;
 - copies of any documents setting out variations to the work agreed by the Beneficiary and the Builder;
 - (iii) copies of all plans and specifications relating to the work agreed to be performed by the Builder; and
 - (iv) copies of any approvals or certificates relating to the work received by the Beneficiary from any relevant public or statutory authority;
- (g) a description of all defective or incomplete work alleged by the Beneficiary together with the date on which it was first observed by the Beneficiary to be defective or incomplete;
- (h) reports obtained by the Beneficiary in relation to the work; and
- (i) details of any prior complaints made or action taken by the Beneficiary in relation to the defective or incomplete work; and

Service Provider means a person appointed by an Insurance Agent other than an employee or officer of the Insurance Agent to investigate, assess, handle or settle a claim (or to do more than one of those things) on behalf of the Insurance Agent.

3. Claims Procedures

3.1 Submission to Director-General

The Insurer must submit to the Director-General at least 10 Business Days before the intended date of operation, its Claims Procedures Manual in respect of Home Warranty Insurance.

3.2 Alterations to Claims Procedures Manual

The Insurer must submit to the Director-General at least 10 Business Days before the intended date of operation any variation of the Claims Procedures Manual previously submitted to the Director-General.

3.3 Consistency with Claims Handling Guidelines

The Insurer's claims procedures must be consistent with these Claims Handling Guidelines and information provided to the Director-General under them.

The Director-General will advise the Insurer if the Director-General is of the opinion that the Insurer's Claims Procedures Manual or any part of them are not consistent with these Claims Handling Guidelines.

3.4 Additional information and consultation

The Director-General is not required to approve or reject the Insurer's Claims Procedures Manual but the Director-General may request the Insurer to:

- (a) provide additional information in respect of the Claims Procedures Manual to the Director-General; and
- (b) consult with the Director-General, or officers of the Department of Services, Technology & Administration nominated by the Director-General for that purpose, in relation to the Insurer's Claims Procedures Manual.

3.5 Consistent behaviour

The Insurer must:

- (a) consult with the Director-General or nominated officers in relation to any inconsistency in its Claims Procedures Manual advised under subclause 3.3 and in relation to any proposed amendments to its Claims Procedures Manual;
- (b) ensure that any copy of its Claims Procedures Manual, and any information in respect of claims handling, provided to each Insurance Agent is consistent with the Claims Procedures Manual last lodged with the Director-General; and
- (c) handle and settle Claims made under Home Warranty Insurance issued by it consistently with the Claims Procedures Manual last lodged with the Director-General.

3.6 Disappearance of a builder

Where a Beneficiary believes that the Builder has disappeared, the Beneficiary may lodge a complaint with NSW Fair Trading in order to locate the Builder and resolve the issues in dispute.

A Beneficiary who has received written notice from NSW Fair Trading that it has been unable to locate the Builder may provide a copy of that notice to the Insurer in satisfaction of the Beneficiary's obligation to conduct due search and inquiry of the location of the Builder.

Note: Where a Beneficiary provides a copy of such notice to the Insurer, the Insurer may nevertheless conduct its own search and inquiry of the location of the Builder in accordance with paragraph 5.6(f).

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4. Publication of Information

4.1 Publication

The Insurer must make publicly available (eg, on its internet web site or those of its Insurance Agents) and, if requested by a Beneficiary, provide the following information:

- (a) information about how to notify the Insurer of a loss that might give rise to a Claim, including any form made available for that purpose by NSW Fair Trading;
- (b) claim forms or information about how to make a Claim, including the Prescribed Claim Information the Beneficiary must provide in order for the Insurer to consider its Claim;
- (c) general claims procedures;
- (d) details of the Insurer's claims service standards (see clause 5);
- (e) details of any claims service standards of Service Providers required by clause 7; and
- (f) details of the complaints handling process required to be used by Insurance Agents and Service Providers including complaints contact persons, phone numbers and email addresses (see clause 8).

Information required to be provided by this clause 4 must be provided free of charge and must be worded and presented in a clear, concise and effective manner.

4.2 Supply to Director-General

The Insurer must supply a copy of the information to be provided under this clause 4 to the Director-General at least 10 Business Days before it is publicly disclosed.

5. Service

5.1 General duty

The Insurer is required to act with promptness and efficiency in relation to all dealings with Beneficiaries including the handling and settling of Claims.

5.2 Lodge claims service standards

The Insurer is required to document the claims service standards and provide a copy to those standards or any variation of them to the Director-General at least 10 Business Days before the intended date of operation.

Note: Paragraph 4.1(d) requires service standards to be made publicly available.

5.3 Amendment of claims service standards

The Director-General will advise the Insurer if the Director-General is of the opinion that the claims service standards are not consistent with these Claims Handling Guidelines.

5.4 Additional information and consultation

The Director-General is not required to approve or reject the claims service standards but the Director-General may request the Insurer to:

(a) provide additional information in respect of the claims service standards to the Director-General; and

(b) consult with the Director-General, or officers of the Department of Services, Technology & Administration nominated by the Director-General for that purpose, in relation to the claims service standards.

5.5 Content of claims service standards

The claims service standards must meet the minimum standards set out in subclause 5.6 and must cover, at least, the response time and general service levels required (including the use of appropriately trained claims staff) and the form and the nature of communications (written or oral) to Beneficiaries (if dealing directly) including in the following situations:

- (a) responding promptly to reasonable requests by Beneficiaries for assistance in making a Claim or notifying a loss that might give rise to a Claim;
- (b) informing Beneficiaries where the Prescribed Claim Information has not been received;
- (c) informing Beneficiaries of the procedure set out in subclause 3.6 where the Beneficiary believes the Builder has disappeared;
- (d) requesting further information in addition to the Prescribed Claim Information;
- (e) when the Prescribed Claim Information has been received, considering and assessing the Claim promptly having regard to the type of Claim made;
- (f) keeping the Beneficiary informed about the progress of a Claim unless a response from the Beneficiary is outstanding;
- (g) where a reasonable period for consideration and assessment of a Claim has passed and where the Prescribed Claim Information has been provided, advising the Beneficiary whether the Claim is accepted or rejected;
- (h) if a Claim is rejected, liability in respect of a Claim is reduced or further information is required, promptly advising the Beneficiary;
- (i) early communication to the Beneficiary where the Insurer believes it cannot meet the claims service standards, including indicating likely response times and the way the Claim will be handled;
- (j) where an error or mistake in dealing with a Claim is identified, taking action promptly to rectify it; and
- (k) ensuring care is taken in assessing Claims by reference to the Prescribed Claim Information, the contract of Home Warranty Insurance and other information relevant to the Claim.

An Insurance Agent may establish its own claims service standards, in addition to the claims service standards in this subclause 5.5. These claims service standards may cover the methods and timeframes in which the Insurance Agent (or the Insurance Agent and its Service Provider) will deal with Beneficiaries in respect of Claims. Where an Insurance Agent establishes its own claims service standards they must not be lower than the claims service standards set out in this subclause 5.5 and in subclause 5.6.

5.6 Minimum claims service standards

The claims service standards of the Insurer must provide as follows:

(a) within five business days of an Insurance Agent receiving notification from a Beneficiary of a loss that might give rise to a Claim, the Insurance Agent will acknowledge receipt of the notification;

- (b) the Insurance Agent will inform the Beneficiary that the Prescribed Claim Information is required in order for the Insurer to assess a Claim;
- (c) a Claim will be deemed to be received by the Insurer when the Insurance Agent receives from the Beneficiary all of the Prescribed Claim Information, whether or not the Beneficiary also provides other information requested by the Insurance Agent and whether or not the Claim has been entered into the Insurance Agent's computer system;
- (d) within five business days of an Insurance Agent receiving an incomplete Claim from a Beneficiary (that is, where an Insurance Agent has not received all of the Prescribed Claim Information), the Insurance Agent will inform the Beneficiary in writing what further Prescribed Claim Information is required;
- (e) within five business days of an Insurance Agent receiving a Claim, the Insurance Agent will:
 - (i) acknowledge receipt of the Claim;
 - (ii) provide an explanation of what steps the Insurance Agent will take to assess the Claim; and
 - (iii) inform the Beneficiary that the Claim will be deemed to be accepted by the Insurer after
 90 days of receipt of the Claim except:
 - (A) where the Claim is accepted or denied earlier;
 - (B) where the Beneficiary otherwise agrees; or
 - (C) as otherwise provided by the Act;
- (f) the Insurance Agent will promptly investigate whether the Builder has died, disappeared or become insolvent and:
 - (i) if at any time the Insurance Agent forms the view that the Builder has not died, disappeared or become insolvent, the Insurance Agent will inform the Beneficiary in writing within five business days and provide details of the source of that belief; and
 - (ii) within 30 days of receiving a Claim, the Insurance Agent will inform the Beneficiary in writing whether or not the Insurance Agent accepts that the Builder has died, disappeared or become insolvent or, alternatively, whether the Insurance Agent requires further information; and

Note: Subclause 6.1 requires a decision to reject a Claim be notified promptly.

(g) within five business days of an Insurance Agent appointing a Service Provider to inspect the property the subject of a Claim, the Insurance Agent will inform the Beneficiary of that fact in writing and will provide the contact details of the Service Provider.

5.7 Financial hardship

The Insurer must establish procedures for handling Claims where it becomes aware that a Beneficiary is experiencing severe financial hardship as a result of the event giving rise to the Claim, including giving appropriate priority to these Claims.

5.8 Supervision of Service Providers

An Insurance Agent must require each Service Provider acting on its behalf to:

(a) operate in a professional manner;

- (b) inform Beneficiaries of their status and the identity of the Insurance Agent for whom they are acting; and
- (c) comply with the Act and these Claims Handling Guidelines.

An Insurance Agent must not authorise a Service Provider to act in matters that do not match their expertise.

5.9 Expertise of Service Providers

Each Service Provider acting on behalf of an Insurance Agent must have:

- (a) been approved by the Insurance Agent;
- (b) a current licence, registration and qualification if required by any applicable law; and
- (c) sufficient expertise to act in relation to the matters for which they have been appointed by the Insurance Agent.

6. Reasons for Decisions

6.1 Documented reasons

The Insurer must document in writing and provide to the Beneficiary the reasons for rejecting a Claim in whole or in part, or reducing its liability in respect of a Claim, and the Insurer must promptly advise the Beneficiary of that decision and the reason for it and the availability of any applicable dispute resolution system.

The Insurer will, on request, provide copies of reports from Service Providers that are relied upon by the Insurer to reject a Claim or reduce its liability in respect of a Claim.

This subclause 6.1 is subject to subclause 6.3.

6.2 Consistency

The reasons referred to in subclause 6.1 must be consistent with the Insurer's Claims Procedures Manual lodged with the Director-General and where appropriate refer to information relied upon by the Insurer for the decision.

6.3 Matters not covered by reasons

Where reasons are provided there is no requirement for the Insurer to disclose information:

- (a) provided by third parties that is confidential or that identifies those third parties;
- (b) that may not be disclosed under law;
- (c) that is subject to legal professional privilege; or
- (d) that may prejudice the Insurer or Insurance Agent in any further investigation or in any dispute in respect of a Home Warranty Insurance claim.

7. Dealing with Service Providers

7.1 Agreement with Service Providers

Where a Service Provider is acting for or providing services to an Insurance Agent in respect of Claims – the Service Provider must, in relation to the activities or functions performed by the Service Provider:

 (a) comply with these Claims Handling Guidelines insofar as they relate to those activities or functions;

- (b) not do anything that may result in the Insurer or the Insurance Agent failing to comply with these Claims Handling Guidelines;
- (c) meet the claims service standards, provide the information and do those things required by subclauses 7.2 to 7.5 and as required by clause 8;

and the Insurance Agent must not deal with a Service Provider in respect of Claims unless the Insurance Agent and the Service Provider have entered into an agreement in a form approved by the Insurer and imposes those obligations on the Service Provider.

Each Insurance Agent must supply a copy of its agreements with each Service Provider (to the extent that each agreement is different) on request by the Insurer, together with a list of each Service Provider with which it has an agreement in respect of Claims.

7.2 Claims service standards

Each Service Provider must either:

- (a) meet the claims service standards specified by the Insurance Agent in accordance with these Claims Handling Guidelines insofar as they relate to the Service Provider's dealings with a Beneficiary; or
- (b) meet claims service standards established by the Service Provider in respect of its dealings with the Beneficiary and agreed by the Insurance Agent which claims service standards satisfy the requirements of clause 5 insofar as they relate to the activities of the Service Provider.

7.3 Self-assessment

An agreement required under subclause 7.1 must make provision for compliance self-assessment to be conducted in respect of the performance of the Service Provider by the Service Provider's internal compliance self-assessment processes or alternatively by the Service Provider's external auditor. For this purpose the agreement must reserve a right to the Insurer to appoint a person to conduct an audit of the Service Provider's compliance with the requirements under the agreement between the Service Provider and the Insurance Agent.

7.4 Notice of non-compliance

If an Insurance Agent becomes aware of a material failure by a Service Provider to comply with the terms of the agreement between the Insurance Agent and the Service Provider or if the Insurance Agent becomes aware of complaints by Beneficiaries in respect of the performance of the Service Provider then the Insurance Agent must require the Service Provider to rectify the non-performance or to explain the reasons for the complaints or both. If the Service Provider fails to do this to the reasonable satisfaction of the Insurance Agent, the Insurance Agent must advise the Service Provider of its non-compliance with the agreement in writing and provide a copy of that notice to the Insurer.

7.5 Information provided to the Director-General

The Insurer may report the non-performance of Insurance Agents or Service Providers to the Director-General, and the Director-General may publish information in relation to the performance and nonperformance of Insurance Agents or Service Providers but such publication will not be made unless or until the Director-General has provided notice to the Insurer, the Insurance Agent and to each Service Provider likely to be named or affected and has consulted with the Insurer, the Insurance Agent and that Service Provider in relation to the material to be published.

7.6 Obligations of Insurer

The obligations of the Insurer in relation to the activities of a Service Provider are to require that each Insurance Agent takes reasonable steps to enforce the agreement between the Service Provider and the Insurance Agent and if necessary to terminate that agreement. Other than to this extent the Insurer is not liable for the activities of a Service Provider in circumstances where it would not otherwise be liable for those activities.

8. Complaints and Disputes

8.1 Internal Dispute Resolution

Each Insurance Agent must apply its internal complaints handling process to Claims under its Home Warranty Insurance business including Claims handled or settled by the Insurance Agent's Service Provider.

Disputes relating to Service Providers must be handled by an Insurance Agent under the Insurance Agent's internal dispute resolution procedure.

8.2 Notification

Each Insurance Agent acting on behalf of the Insurer must make details of its complaints handling process publicly available (eg, on its internet web site) and must inform each Beneficiary that makes a Claim that a complaints handling process exists and the Insurance Agent must require any Service Provider involved in handling or settling Claims on its behalf to provide the same information in respect of the Insurance Agent's complaints handling process.

Note: A complaint is to be distinguished from an inquiry. A complaint will only arise for the purposes of this provision where the person making the complaint requests the complaint to be registered or to be referred to the internal dispute handling process of the Insurance Agent. An Insurance Agent that receives a complaint must ask the complainant whether or not that person wishes the complaint to be registered or referred to the internal dispute settlement process.

8.3 Register of complaints

Each Insurance Agent must establish a register of complaints and disputes and on the register will record the nature of each complaint and dispute and how and when it was resolved. An Insurance Agent must ensure that these details are also recorded in relation to any complaints received by its Service Provider and disputes involving its Service Provider.

8.4 Provision of information to Director-General

Each Insurance Agent must make available to the Insurer information from each register established under subclause 8.3 in respect of complaints as and when requested. The Insurer will provide a report of this information to the Director-General on a half-yearly basis or as otherwise agreed with the Director-General.

8.5 Publication

The Director-General may publish a summary of the number of complaints and the type of complaints contained on the registers established under subclause 8.3.

Preliminary

1 Background

- (a) Section 11 of the *Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal Act* 1992 (NSW) permits IPART to conduct investigations and make reports to the Minister on the determination of the pricing for a government monopoly service supplied by a government agency specified in Schedule 1 of the IPART Act.
- (b) Country Energy (Country Energy) is listed as a government agency for the purposes of Schedule 1 of the IPART Act. The services of Country Energy declared as monopoly services under the *Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (Country Energy) Order 2008* (Order) are:
 - (1) water supply services;
 - (2) sewerage services;
 - (3) trade waste services; and
 - (4) ancillary and miscellaneous customer services for which no alternative supply exists and which relate to the provision of services of a kind referred to in paragraphs (1) to (3),

(together the Monopoly Services).

Accordingly, IPART may determine the prices for the Monopoly Services.

- (c) In investigating and reporting on the pricing of the Monopoly Services, IPART has had regard to a broad range of matters, including the criteria set out in section 15(1) of the IPART Act.
- (d) In accordance with section 13A of the IPART Act, IPART has fixed the maximum price for the Monopoly Services.
- (e) Under section 18(2) of the IPART Act, Country Energy may not fix a price below that determined by IPART without the approval of the Treasurer.

2 Application of this determination

- (a) This determination fixes the maximum prices that Country Energy may charge for the Monopoly Services.
- (b) This determination commences on the later of 1 July 2010 and the date that it is published in the NSW Government Gazette (Commencement Date).

Water supply, sewerage and other water services supplied by Country Energy **IPART** 1

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(c) The maximum prices in this determination apply from the Commencement Date to 30 June 2013. The maximum prices in this determination prevailing at 30 June 2013 continue to apply beyond 30 June 2013 until this determination is replaced.

3 Monitoring

IPART may monitor the performance of Country Energy for the purposes of:

- (a) establishing and reporting on the level of compliance by Country Energy with this determination; and
- (b) preparing a periodic review of pricing policies in respect of the Monopoly Services supplied by Country Energy.

4 Schedules

- (a) Schedule 1 and the tables in that schedule set out the maximum prices that Country Energy may charge for water supply services.
- (b) Schedule 2 and the tables in that schedule set out the maximum prices that Country Energy may charge for sewerage services.
- (c) Schedule 3 and the tables in that schedule set out the maximum prices that Country Energy may charge for trade waste services.
- (d) Schedule 4 and the table in that schedule set out the maximum prices that Country Energy may charge for ancillary and miscellaneous customer services.
- (e) Schedule 5 sets out the definitions and interpretation provisions.

2 IPART Water supply, sewerage and other water services supplied by Country Energy

1 Application

This schedule sets the maximum prices that Country Energy may charge for the Monopoly Services under paragraph (a) of the Order (water supply services).

2 Categories for pricing purposes

Prices for water supply services have been determined for 6 categories:

- (a) Metered Residential Properties;
- (b) Metered Non Residential Properties;
- (c) Vacant Land;
- (d) Exempt Land;
- (e) Multi Premises; and
- (f) Pipeline Properties.

3 Charges for water supply services to Metered Residential Properties

The maximum price that may be levied by Country Energy for the provision of water supply services to a Metered Residential Property (connected to the Water Supply System) is the sum of the following:

- (a) the water service charge in Table 1, corresponding to the Meter size; and
- (b) the following usage charges, as applicable:
 - (1) the Treated Water usage charge which is:
 - (A) **for Tier One Average Daily Consumption of Treated Water**, calculated as follows:

 $TW \ x \ ADC \ x \ D$

Where:

TW = Treated Water usage charge in Table 2;

ADC = Tier One Average Daily Consumption (in kL) of Treated Water; and

Water supply, sewerage and other water services supplied by Country Energy **IPART 3**

- **D** = number of days in the Meter Reading Period; and
- (B) **for Tier Two Average Daily Consumption of Treated Water**, calculated as follows:

 $TW \ x \ ADC \ x \ D$

Where:

TW = Treated Water usage charge in Table 2;

ADC = Tier Two Average Daily Consumption (in kL) of Treated Water; and

D = number of days in the Meter Reading Period;

- (2) the Chlorinated Water usage charge which is:
 - (A) for Tier One Average Daily Consumption of Chlorinated Water, calculated as follows:

 $CW \quad x \quad ADC \quad x \quad D$

Where:

CW = the Chlorinated Water usage charge in Table 3;

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4 Charges for water supply services to Metered Non Residential Properties

The maximum price that may be levied by Country Energy for the provision of water supply services to a Metered Non Residential Property (connected to the Water Supply System) is the sum of the following:

- (a) the water service charge in Table 1, corresponding to the Meter size;
- (b) the following usage charges, as applicable:
 - (1) the Treated Water usage charge which is:
 - (A) **for Tier One Average Daily Consumption of Treated Water**, calculated as follows:

 $TW \ x \ ADC \ x \ D$

Where:

TW = Treated Water usage charge in Table 2;

ADC = Tier One Average Daily Consumption (in kL) of Treated Water; and

D = number of days in the Meter Reading Period; and

(B) **for Tier Two Average Daily Consumption of Treated Water**, calculated as follows:

 $TW \ x \ ADC \ x \ D$

Where:

TW = Treated Water usage charge in Table 2;

ADC = Tier Two Average Daily Consumption (in kL) of Treated Water; and

D = number of days in the Meter Reading Period;

- (2) the Chlorinated Water usage charge which is:
 - (A) for Tier One Average Daily Consumption of Chlorinated Water, calculated as follows:

CW x ADC x D

Where:

CW = the Chlorinated Water usage charge in Table 3;

ADC = Tier One Average Daily Consumption (in kL) of Chlorinated Water; and

D = number of days in the Meter Reading Period; and

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(B) for Tier Two Average Daily Consumption of Chlorinated Water, calculated as follows:

 $CW \quad x \quad ADC \quad x \quad D$

Where:

CW = the Chlorinated Water usage charge in Table 3;

ADC = Tier Two Average Daily Consumption (in kL) of Chlorinated Water; and

D = number of days in the Meter Reading Period;

- (3) the Untreated Water usage charge which is the Untreated Water usage charge in Table 4 multiplied by the volume (in kL) of the Untreated Water used in the Meter Reading Period; and
- (4) the Effluent Water usage charge which is the Effluent Water usage charge in Table 5 multiplied by the volume (in kL) of the Effluent Water used in the Meter Reading Period.

5 Charges for water supply services to Vacant Land

The maximum price that may be levied by Country Energy for the provision of water supply services to Vacant Land which is not connected to the Water Supply System but is reasonably available for connection to the Water Supply System is the water service charge in Table 6.

6 Charges for water supply services to Exempt Land

The maximum price that may be levied by Country Energy for the provision of water supply services to Exempt Land is the water usage charge in Table 7 multiplied by the volume (in kL) of Treated Water used.

7 Levying water supply charges on Multi Premises

7.1 Water supply charges for Multi Premises

- (a) This clause 7 prescribes how the maximum prices in this schedule are to be levied on Multi Premises, specifically how they are levied on persons who own, control or occupy those Multi Premises.
- (b) Clause 3 of this schedule does not apply to Metered Properties if this clause 7 is capable of applying to those Properties.
- 6 **IPART** Water supply, sewerage and other water services supplied by Country Energy

7.2 Strata Title Lot within a Strata Title Building with a Common Water Meter or multiple Common Water Meters

For a Strata Title Lot within a Strata Title Building which:

- (b) the Untreated Water usage charge which is:
 - (1) for Average Daily Consumption of Untreated Water up to and including 1.096kL, calculated as follows:

UW x ADC x D

Where:

UW = the Untreated Water usage charge in Table 9;

ADC = Average Daily Consumption (in kL) of Untreated Water, to the extent that it is less than or equal to 1.096kL; and

D = number of days in the Meter Reading Period; and

(2) for Average Daily Consumption of Untreated Water exceeding 1.096kL, calculated as follows:

UW x ADC x D

Where:

UW = the Untreated Water usage charge in Table 9;

ADC = Average Daily Consumption (in kL) of Untreated Water to the extent that it exceeds 1.096kL; and

D = number of days in the Meter Reading Period.

1 Application

This schedule sets the maximum prices that Country Energy may charge for the Monopoly Services under paragraph (b) of the Order (sewerage services).

2 Categories for pricing purposes

Prices for sewerage services have been determined for 5 categories:

- (a) Residential Properties;
- (b) Non Residential Properties;
- (c) Vacant Land;
- (d) Exempt Land; and
- (e) Multi Premises.

3 Charges for sewerage services to Residential Properties

3.1 Charges for sewerage services to a Residential Property (other than a Residential Property located in Perilya Area) connected to the Sewerage System

The maximum price that may be levied by Country Energy for sewerage services to a Residential Property (other than a Residential Property located in the Perilya Area) connected to the Sewerage System is the sewerage service charge in Table 10.

3.2 Charges for sewerage services to a Residential Property in Perilya Area connected to the Sewerage System

The maximum price that may be levied by Country Energy for sewerage services to a Residential Property in the Perilya Area which is:

- (a) connected to the Sewerage System; and
- (b) deemed by Country Energy to be occupied,

is the sewerage service charge in Table 10.

Schedule 2 — Sewerage Services

4 Charges for sewerage services to Non Residential Properties

4.1 Charges for sewerage services to a Non Residential Property (other than a Non Residential Property located in Perilya Area) connected to the Sewerage System

The maximum price that may be levied by Country Energy for sewerage services to a Non Residential Property (other than a Non Residential Property located in the Perilya Area) connected to the Sewerage System is:

- (a) the sewerage service charge in Table 11, corresponding to the Meter size; and
- (b) the sewerage usage charge in Table 12.

4.2 Charges for sewerage services to a Non Residential Property located in the Perilya Area connected to the Sewerage System

The maximum price that may be levied by Country Energy for sewerage services to a Non Residential Property located in the Perilya Area connected to the Sewerage System with a Meter or multiple Meters is:

- (a) the sewerage service charge in Table 11 for each Meter (assuming that each Meter is a 100mm Meter); and
- (b) the sewerage usage charge in Table 12.

5 Charges for sewerage services to Vacant Land

The maximum price that may be levied by Country Energy for sewerage services to Vacant Land which is not connected to the Sewerage System but is reasonably available for connection to the Sewerage System is the sewerage service charge in Table 10.

6 Charges for sewerage services to Exempt Land

The maximum price that may be levied by Country Energy for sewerage services to Exempt Land is the sewerage usage charge in Table 12.

7 Levying charges for sewerage services on Multi Premises

7.1 Sewerage service charges for Multi Premises

- (a) This clause 7 prescribes how the maximum prices in this schedule are to be levied on Multi Premises, specifically how they are levied on persons who own, control or occupy those Multi Premises.
- (b) Clauses 3 and 4 of this schedule do not apply to Properties connected to the Sewerage System if this clause 7 is capable of applying to those Properties.

7.2 Strata Title Lot which is a Residential Property

For a Strata Title Lot (which is a Residential Property) within a Strata Title Building where that Strata Title Building is connected to the Sewerage System, the maximum price that may be levied by Country Energy on that Strata Title Lot for the provision of sewerage services to that Strata Title Lot is the sewerage service charge in Table 10.

7.3 Strata Title Lot which is a Non Residential Property

For a Strata Title Lot (which is a Non Residential Property) within a Strata Title Building where that Strata Title Building:

- (a) is connected to the Sewerage System; and
- (b) has a Common Water Meter or multiple Common Water Meters,

the maximum price that may be levied by Country Energy on that Strata Title Lot for the provision of sewerage services to that Strata Title Lot is:

- (c) the sewerage service charge in Table 11, corresponding to the Meter size; and
- (d) the sewerage usage charge determined by the following formula:

$$SUC = \frac{A}{B} \quad x \quad C$$

Where:

SUC = sewerage usage charge for that Strata Title Lot;

A = the water in kL (recorded by all Common Water Meters);

B = the number of Strata Title Lots in the Strata Title Building; and

C = the sewerage usage charge in Table 12.

Schedule 2 — Sewerage Services

7.4 Multi Premises which is not a Strata Title Building

The maximum price that may be levied by Country Energy on a Multi Premises Property which is not a Strata Title Lot connected to the Sewerage System is the sewerage service charge in Table 10.

Schedule 5 — Definitions and Interpretation

1 Definitions

1.1 General definitions

In this determination:

Average Daily Consumption means the water used (in kL) by a Metered Property or a Pipeline Property (as the case may be) during a Meter Reading Period, divided by the number of days in that Meter Reading Period.

Category 1 Trade Waste Discharge means trade waste discharge which:

- (a) arises from an activity conducted on a Non Residential Property; and
- (b) is deemed by Country Energy to be of a low risk nature and to require nil or minimal pre-treatment prior to its discharge into the Sewerage System.

Category 1a Trade Waste Discharge means trade waste discharge which:

- (a) arises from an activity conducted on a Non Residential Property; and
- (b) is deemed by Country Energy to be of a low risk nature but to require a more sophisticated prescribed pre-treatment than Category 1 Trade Waste Discharge prior to its discharge into the Sewerage System.

Category 2 Trade Waste Discharge means trade waste discharge which:

- (a) arises from an activity conducted on a Non Residential Property; and
- (b) is deemed by Country Energy to be of a medium risk nature and to require a prescribed type of liquid trade waste pre-treatment prior to being discharged into the Sewerage System.

Category 3 Trade Waste Discharge means trade waste discharge which:

- (a) arises from an activity conducted on a Non Residential Property; and
- (b) is deemed by Country Energy to be of either a high volume (over 20 kL per day) and/or of an industrial nature and to require a prescribed type of liquid trade waste pre-treatment prior to being discharged into the Sewerage System.

Chlorinated Water means water that has been treated with a chlorine disinfection process, but not filtered to remove solids and organic particles.

Commencement Date is defined in clause 2(b) of the *Preliminary* section of this determination.

Common Water Meter means a Meter which is connected or available for connection to Multi Premises, where the Meter measures the water usage to that Multi Premises but not to each relevant Property located on or within that Multi Premises.

Country Energy means Country Energy as defined in clause 1(b) of the *Preliminary* section of this determination.

df% or **Discharge Factor** means, in relation to a Property, the percentage of water supplied to that Property which Country Energy assesses or deems to be discharged into the Sewerage System.

Effluent Water means sewerage or waste water that has been treated at a sewerage treatment plant before being re-used or discharged to the environment.

Exempt Land means land described in Schedule 4 of the Water Management Act.

GST means the Goods and Services Tax as defined in *A New Tax System* (*Goods and Services Tax*) *Act* 1999 (Cth).

IPART means the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal of New South Wales established under the IPART Act.

IPART Act means the *Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal Act* 1992 (NSW).

kL means kilolitre or one thousand litres.

Local Government Act means the Local Government Act 1993 (NSW).

Menindee Pipeline means the water pipeline which runs from Menindee to Broken Hill.

Meter means an apparatus for the measurement of water.

Metered Non Residential Property means a Non Residential Property that is serviced by a Meter.

Metered Property means a Metered Residential Property or a Metered Non Residential Property.

Meter Reading Period means the period equal to the number of days between:

(a) the date on which the Meter was last read (or taken to have been read by Country Energy); and

(b) the date on which the Meter was read (or taken to have been read by Country Energy) immediately preceding the date in paragraph (a).

Metered Residential Property means a Residential Property that is serviced by a Meter.

Monopoly Services means the Monopoly Services as defined in clause 1(b) of the *Preliminary* section of this determination.

Multi Premises means land where there are two or more Multi Premises Properties located on it.

Multi Premises Property includes:

- (a) a Strata Title Lot;
- (b) a part of a building lawfully occupied or available for occupation (other than a building to which paragraph (a) applies).

Multi Premises Tier One Average Daily Consumption means an Average Daily Consumption which is:

- (a) 1.645kL multiplied by the number of Multi Premises Properties in the Multi Premises/day or less in the Summer Period; and
- (b) 1.096kL multiplied by the number of Multi Premises Properties in the Multi Premises / day or less at any other time.

Multi Premises Tier Two Average Daily Consumption means an Average Daily Consumption to the extent that it exceeds:

- (a) 1.645kL multiplied by the number of Multi Premises Properties in the Multi Premises/day in the Summer Period; and
- (b) 1.096kL multiplied by the number of Multi Premises Properties in the Multi Premises/day at any other time.

Non Residential Property means a Property that is not a Residential Property or Vacant Land.

Order means the Order defined in clause 1(b) of the *Preliminary* section of this determination and published in the New South Wales Government Gazette No. 147 on 14 November 2008.

Perilya Area means that area in or around Broken Hill which is occupied by Perilya Limited for the purpose of its mining and exploration activities.

Perilya Limited means Perilya Limited ACN 009 193 695, a company which undertakes mining and exploration activities in the Broken Hill area.

Pipeline Property means a property which is able to access Untreated Water via a direct connection to the Menindee Pipeline or the Umberumberka Pipeline.

Property includes:

- (a) a Strata Title Lot;
- (b) a part of a building lawfully occupied or available for occupation (other than a building to which paragraph (a) applies); or
- (c) land.

Rateable Land has the meaning given to that term under the Local Government Act.

Residential Property means a Property where:

- (a) in the case of that Property being Rateable Land, that Property is categorised as:
 - (1) residential under section 516 of the Local Government Act; or
 - (2) farmland under section 515 of the Local Government Act; or
- (b) in the case of that Property not being Rateable Land, the dominant use of that Property is residential applying the classifications in section 516 of the Local Government Act.

Sewerage System means the sewerage system owned and operated by Country Energy.

Strata Title Building means a building that is subject to a strata scheme under the *Strata Schemes* (*Freehold Development*) *Act* 1973 (NSW).

Strata Title Lot means a lot as defined under the *Strata Schemes (Freehold Development) Act* 1973 (NSW).

Summer Period means the period between 1 December and 24 March in any year.

Tier One Average Daily Consumption means an Average Daily Consumption which is:

- (a) 1.645kL/day or less in the Summer Period; and
- (b) 1.096kL/day or less at any other time.

Tier Two Average Daily Consumption means an Average Daily Consumption to the extent that it exceeds:

- (a) 1.645kL/day in the Summer Period; and
- (b) 1.096kL/day at any other time.

Schedule 5 — Definitions and Interpretation

Treated Water means water that has been treated with a disinfection process and filtered to a standard that is primarily intended for human consumption.

Umberumberka Pipeline means the pipeline which runs from Umberumberka to Broken Hill.

Untreated Water means water in its natural state, prior to any treatment process.

Vacant Land means land with no capital improvements on it.

Water Management Act means the Water Management Act 2000 (NSW).

Water Supply System means the water supply system owned and operated by Country Energy.

 - (2) whose powers or functions are transferred to another body,

is a reference to the body which replaces it or which substantially succeeds to its powers or functions.

2.2 Explanatory notes and clarification notice

- (a) Explanatory notes do not form part of this determination, but in the case of uncertainty may be relied on for interpretation purposes.
- (b) IPART may publish a clarification notice in the NSW Government Gazette to correct any manifest error in this determination as if that clarification notice formed part of this determination.

Parliamentary Remuneration Act 1989 Report Pursuant to Section 13(1) of the Act

Introduction

Section 11 of the Parliamentary Remuneration Act 1989 ("the Act") prescribes that the Parliamentary Remuneration Tribunal ("the Tribunal") shall make an annual Determination as to the additional entitlements for Members and Recognised Office Holders (as defined under the Act) on or before 1 June in each year or on such later date as the President of the Industrial Relations Commission of New South Wales determines.

Section 13(1) of the Act requires that the Tribunal makes a report to the President of the Industrial Relations Commission of New South Wales for each Determination made by the Tribunal. The President is then required, as soon as practicable after receipt of the report, to forward it to the Minister (see section 13(2)).

As is the usual practice of the Tribunal, letters were sent to all Members and the Presiding Officers inviting them to raise with the Tribunal matters they wished to have considered as part of the review. The Tribunal received submissions from the major political parties, individual Members and the Presiding Officers.

Part one of this Report will outline general matters raised as part of the annual review and those issues that, in the Tribunal's view, merit further consideration and/or comment. Consistent with the usual practice, the Tribunal has made changes that are considered minor or of an administrative nature to the Determination without the need for detailed separate reasons being provided. Part Two provides a general summary of the Determination.

Part one

1. General Matters Raised

Electoral Allowance

The Tribunal has received a number of submissions seeking an adjustment in the quantum of the Electoral Allowance in line with the Consumer Price Index (CPI). For a number of years the Tribunal has increased the Electoral Allowance in line with the annual CPI. For this review the Tribunal has adopted its usual approach and increased the electoral allowance by 2.9 per cent ie the CPI increase between March 2009 and March 2010.

The Tribunal has again received a submission seeking to have the unspent portion of the Electoral Allowance not fully expended returned to the Consolidated Fund rather than being retained by Members. As has previously been advised, the Tribunal's sole function in respect of this Allowance is to determine its quantum. Any changes in the Tribunal's role in respect of the Electoral Allowance would require legislative amendment.

Sydney Allowance

The Tribunal received submissions seeking to increase the quantum of the Sydney Allowance by either the CPI or to levels equivalent to the travel allowances payable to public servants for overnight stays in Sydney. Submissions also provided details on long term rental movements in Sydney over the previous twelve months. These movements showed that rents had increased on average by \$70 per week.

Since the introduction of the Allowance in 1975 the Tribunal has set the daily rate of the Sydney Allowance at a lower level than the ad hoc capital city travel rate available to public sector employees on the premise that Members would make longer term accommodation arrangements in Sydney.

The Tribunal is aware that Members from non-metropolitan electorates make a variety of arrangements when staying overnight in Sydney on Parliamentary business. For this reason the Tribunal has regard to a number of factors when determining the appropriate quantum of this allowance, including movements in the CPI and commercial and rental accommodation costs.

Between 2005 and 2008, the Tribunal increased the Sydney Allowance by 33% (from \$180 per night to \$240 per night) in recognition of the considerable increases in accommodation costs in Sydney during

that period. In 2009, the Tribunal increased the Sydney allowance in line with CPI to \$246 per day. By way of comparison, Federal Members receive \$230 per overnight stay in Canberra.

In respect of increases in rentals, the December 2009 quarter figures provided by the Real Estate Institute of Australia on the rents for one bedroom units in inner Sydney varied between \$350 per week and \$470 per week with the median rental being \$400 pw. This represents an average increase of 1.3% since December 2008.

The Tribunal also has information on Government accommodation rates at hotels in Sydney, ranging from \$129 per night to \$170 per night.

While the Tribunal acknowledges that rents will fluctuate from time to time, the Tribunal also notes that Members do not exclusively rent units in the inner city of Sydney. Members making long term accommodation arrangements have the discretion to make such arrangements as their particular circumstances dictate. The Tribunal's role is to ensure that Members who necessarily incur additional costs arising from having to travel and stay in Sydney on parliamentary business, are reasonably reimbursed through the Sydney Allowance for these additional costs. As the Tribunal has previously stated, Allowances determined are set at what the Tribunal considers to be a reasonable level. This was clearly expressed in the Tribunal's Report on Sydney Allowance in 2005.

"...Members' entitlements, applied as they are uniformly to Members of both Houses, cannot always meet the specific needs of every Member. There are Members who utilise all their entitlements and there are those who under-utilise these entitlements. In the end the Tribunal can only make an assessment on what is reasonable for the majority of Members and provide sufficient flexibility to best meet their needs."

On this basis the Tribunal finds that any increase greater than the CPI is not warranted and determines that the Sydney Allowance be increased by the CPI to \$253 per day.

2. Number of overnight stays

The Tribunal has again received submissions seeking an increase in the number of overnight stays. The number of overnight stays was last increased in 2005 by 15 days per annum for Members.

In its 2005 Report, the Tribunal expressed the following principle in respect of overnight stays:

....The Tribunal has for many years adopted the principle that entitlements for Members should. be consistent for both Houses as this provides the most equitable approach to remuneration setting. In the current case, for example, Legislative Council Members may have to spend more time in Sydney attending Committee meetings but Members of the Legislative Assembly spend more time in Sydney attending sittings of Parliament."

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The Tribunal notes that the number of parliamentary sitting days have not increased over the last few years. There has also been insufficient evidence provided to suggest that the occasions members are spending in Sydney attending Committee meetings or attending other parliamentary business has increased to warrant a review of the number of overnight stays. On the basis of information provided, therefore, the Tribunal does not consider an increase in the number of overnight stays is warranted.

The Tribunal has also considered a submission regarding the administration of the Sydney Allowance and in particular the rules surrounding the level of proof to be presented by Members to confirm the overnight stay. Additional entitlements are provided to Members to meet the costs associated with parliamentary duties. As public money is provided for this purpose there must be sufficient rigour around the proper use of additional entitlements. The Tribunal considers that the existing conditions provide a proper balance between such rigour and flexibility to meet Members' needs.

Acquittal of Entitlement

The Auditor General, in his Report to Parliament for the year ended 30 June 2009, recommended that the Tribunal consider introducing sanctions against Members who do not reimburse the Parliament their unspent annual entitlement within the specified time.

Sydney Allowance is available to Members on either a daily basis or an annual basis. At the end of each year, Members in receipt of the annual entitlement are required to acquit the number of overnight stays and repay the unspent portion of the allowance. Essentially this is simply a matter of the Member subtracting the number of actual overnight stays in Sydney from the maximum number applicable and repaying the difference. As part of its 2008 review, the Tribunal determined that Members in receipt of the annual amount were required to repay the unspent portion by 31 August ie within 61 days of the end of the financial year.

For the 2009 review the Tribunal extended the time for repayment, until 30 September ie within 90 days of the end of the financial year.

The Tribunal expects Members to adhere to the conditions attached to the various additional entitlements. The requirement to repay the unspent portion of the Sydney Allowance within 90 days of the end of the financial year is not considered excessive and the Tribunal can find no reason why this should be the case. The Tribunal expects, as would the community expect, that Members when

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required to repay public monies would do so promptly. The Tribunal accepts that the majority of Members do make reimbursements expeditiously.

To resolve this issue, the Tribunal will provide for additional sanctions to be imposed against those Members who do not reimburse outstanding amounts by 30 September each year. These sanctions will include the suspension of annual entitlement and a reversion to a daily rate until the reimbursement is made. The Tribunal also recommends that the Presiding Officers consider publishing the names of those Members who have not repaid the unused portion of Sydney Allowance within the specified time.

Logistic Support Allocation (LSA)

The Presiding Officers have requested the Tribunal adjust the quantum of the Logistic Support Allocation by \$1,500 per annum to compensate Members for the cost of purchasing portable electronic communication equipment. This equipment was previously supplied by Parliament.

In 2009, the Tribunal determined that Members would fund the purchase of portable electronic communication devices (laptops, blackberries etc) from their Logistic Support Allocation.

To test the contention that additional funds were required by members to purchase electronic communication equipment, a review was conducted of the LSA balances as at 30 June 2009. The figures provided by the Parliament show that nearly 66% of Members carried forward more than \$5,000 to the 09/10 year and nearly 50% of Members carried forward balances of more than \$10,000.

On this basis, the Tribunal is not convinced that additional annual increases in Members' LSA are warranted. The Tribunal also notes that while Members are now required to fund portable electronic equipment it was never the Tribunal's intention that additional funds would be provided for this purpose. In this respect it should be noted that the Parliament is making a saving from these changed arrangements and if funding this equipment becomes an issue the Parliament should examine alternative funding arrangements.

The Presiding Officers have also sought increases in Members LSA for minor matters like toilet and cleaning requisites and the removal of restrictions on the type and the nature of telephone calls that can be reimbursed from home telephones. In respect of the former, the Tribunal has considered such matters in the past and can only note again that the provisioning of electorate offices (including essential consumables is properly a function of the Legislative Assembly and not individual Members. In respect of the latter, the Tribunal considers that the present restrictions on the types of calls that

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can be reimbursed eg overseas phone calls, continues to be appropriate and will not be making any adjustments. If the Legislature finds the dissection of these accounts onerous, then the Presiding Officers may wish to issue a policy that Members must provide reconciled accounts for payment.

The Presiding Officers have also sought the Tribunal's approval for Members to provide their staff with mobile phones paid for from the Member's LSA. As noted in this Determination, Members entitlements are for the use of Members in connection with their parliamentary duties. If Members wish to provide their electorate staff with a mobile phone to assist the Member then they should consider using their Electoral Allowance for this purpose.

The Tribunal will be increasing the LSA by the CPI increase of 2.9%.

"Trade ins"

One submission proposed that any value the Parliament receives for electronic items surrendered by a Member be credited to the Member's LSA.

All entitlements provided to Members are funded through the consolidated fund. It is therefore appropriate that any monetary value of disposed equipment be reimbursed to that fund.

Corporate Credit Cards

The Tribunal was informed by the Presiding Officers that Parliament has trialled the use of corporate cards to Members, and that the review suggested that there was merit in introducing the use of corporate credit cards.

The Tribunal supports the introduction of a corporate card to pay for items and services associated with Members carrying out their parliamentary duties. The Tribunal has been advised that Members normally use their private credit cards for LSA related expenditure and that considerable time is expended in separating private and parliamentary expenditure recorded on credit card statements. The Tribunal considers that by using corporate credit cards (with adequate guidelines around their use), would result in reconciliation efficiencies and also enhanced transparency in expenditure.

Working Party

The Tribunal received a request to establish a working party to meet with the Tribunal three times a year as part of the proceedings to review parliamentary remuneration.

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The Tribunal provides ample opportunity for all Members to participate in its proceedings and to be heard by means of making submissions at the time when the Tribunal conducts its annual review. The Tribunal has considered this request but is of the view that the existing arrangements are

adequate.

Staff Travel

Submissions have been received seeking an increase in the LSA to cater for the additional costs associated with paying travel expenses for staff travelling to Sydney with the Member for parliamentary duties.

The Tribunal has determined that Members of Parliament may employ an additional staff member for a total of 61 days to cover parliamentary sittings. The Tribunal understands that some Members bring their staff member to Sydney on such occasions to work out of the Member's Parliament House office but others do not.

While submissions have asked for a general increase for this purpose, there has been no evidence provided as to how broadly, and with what frequency, staff travel to Sydney with the Member on parliamentary sitting days. The Tribunal has also not been advised as to the types of duties these staff members perform while in Sydney. If, for example, such staff members undertake basic secretarial and/or reception services, there is no reason why such staff cannot be employed from Sydney. Furthermore, with the electronic communication equipment now available to all Members, the Tribunal has not been persuaded, based on the evidence available, why a staff member would be required to be in Sydney to attend to electorate based matters.

Until such time as a proper review of these arrangements is undertaken, the Tribunal is not prepared to increase the LSA for this purpose. As also noted above, Members' LSA balances suggest there is sufficient scope within existing entitlements to meet such costs.

Electorate to Sydney Travel

The Tribunal has again received submissions seeking a review of this entitlement to provide greater equity in its application.

This matter was considered most recently in the 2008 Report. No additional information has been provided by Members to warrant a review of the existing arrangements. The Tribunal, therefore, adheres to its decision that the application of the electorate to Sydney travel warrants and the rules surrounding such travel are on balance fair and reasonable

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The Presiding Officers have sought the inclusion of the office of Assistant President of the Legislative Council as an office eligible for additional electorate to Sydney travel warrants. It is noted in the submission that the Assistant President may claim a higher rate of travelling allowance and therefore should receive additional travel warrants and other enhanced entitlements eg reimbursement of electronic communication costs.

The Tribunal notes that in the Legislative Assembly, the office of Chair of Committees has been abolished and the functions of the Chair are performed by the new office of Assistant Speaker. It is therefore appropriate for this office to receive the same entitlements formerly provided to the Chair of Committees in the Legislative Assembly.

The Tribunal notes however that the office of Chair of Committees in the Legislative Council has not been abolished but is combined in the office of *Deputy President and Chair of Committees in the Legislative Council.*

On this basis the Tribunal can see no reason why the entitlements should be extended to the Assistant President in the Legislative Council. The Tribunal is prepared to consider this matter further if additional supporting evidence is provided. It should be noted that the rate of travelling Allowance is not a basis for determining enhancements to other additional entitlements.

Electorate Charter Transport

The Tribunal has received submissions requesting an extension to this entitlement to reimburse Members of the electorates of Barwon and Murray Darling for any additional costs associated in using their own aircraft for travel within their electorates. Such costs include hangar, inspection and landing fees.

The Determination was amended in 2009 to enable the Member for the Electorate of Murray Darling and the Member for the Electorate of Barwon to seek reimbursement for the use of their own aircraft where applicable. These Members were allowed to seek reimbursement for the cost of fuel used in the Member's private aircraft for travel within the Member's Electorate on parliamentary business.

This Allowance is only to be used in connection with parliamentary duties within the Member's electorate and cannot be used during election campaigns or for other electioneering or party political activities. Fuel costs can be clearly linked to parliamentary business and the Tribunal has been advised that landing fees are paid on a per flight basis. The Tribunal considers that landing fees

for those flights made in connection with parliamentary business may also be claimed from this entitlement.

The Tribunal does not support broadly extending this entitlement to reimburse Members for any additional costs associated with Members flying their own aircraft at this time. The Tribunal would require a detailed submission of options from the Presiding Officers on any other costs eg hangar and inspection fees before giving further consideration to these claims.

Funding for Equipment, Services and Facilities

The Tribunal was requested to make a Determination as to the level of funding that should be provided for the provision of these services and facilities.

Providing a monetary value on the cost of equipping an electorate office (down to such things as cups and saucers) was proposed in the Determination of 1999 but was rejected at that time. As a result, the provision of an appropriate level of equipment services and facilities in its current form was adopted in the Tribunal's 2000 Determination. The Tribunal does not support the calculation of a monetary value for the cost of furnishing and equipping an electorate office. Each office is different and many have different needs and requirements. The Tribunal would also be required to determine replacement values, oversight depreciation schedules and on going monitoring of cost escalations in furniture and fittings. The Tribunal considers that expressing equipment services and facilities in monetary terms would provide an unacceptable level of complexity in the Tribunal's deliberations.

It should be noted that although the Tribunal has flexibility in how additional entitlements are to be determined its powers are not unlimited. Section 10(3) of the Act provides:

"...(3) A determination may provide for additional entitlements in any form, including but not limited to:

(a) the payment of additional allowances in terms of allowances, fees and other emoluments payable in money (including for example travel allowances, travel expenses, and committee allowances), and

(b) the provision of services, facilities and equipment (including for example electorate services, electorate staff, electorate offices, office equipment, travel, and communication equipment)."

Extra Staff Member

The Tribunal received submissions seeking the provision of a third full time electorate officer to replace the 61 days a year to cover parliamentary sittings. Members advised that issues handled

through electorate offices have increased in quantity and complexity, especially over the last four to five years.

In 2006, the Tribunal undertook an extensive review of staffing levels for Members. The review was broad reaching and covered staffing both in electorate offices and in Parliament House. In this review, the Tribunal concluded overall, while there had been an increase in the workload of electorate officers to warrant additional support, it was not satisfied that the workload was consistent in all electorate offices as to justify the salary, on cost and the additional cost of refitting electorate offices for a third full time electorate officer. Nothing presented during this annual determination has changed this assessment.

The Tribunal considers that the provision of a third full time staff member would pose a significant increase in costs and would require a proper work value assessment to be carried out. Such assessment may also require inspections of members' offices as occurred when the last review of this item was conducted by the Tribunal.

The Presiding Officers have also sought an amendment to the existing arrangements where a Member does not fully utilise the Temporary Staff Allocation by the end of the financial year. It was proposed that the Member may carry forward to the next year any unexpended amount. It was argued that Members have variable periods of activity throughout the year that do not conform to the financial year cycle.

The Tribunal does not accept the premise of this claim. Members have an Allocation that they may expend within the financial year. In the next financial year a new Allocation is provided and may be utilised by Members. The key point to note is that the Allocation is based on an additional staff resource for a maximum of 61 days per financial year. Allowing Members to carry forward unspent portions could ultimately lead to Members not employing an additional staff Member for the first three years of the parliamentary term and then employing an additional staff member for up to 244 days in the election year (61 x 4). This would result in a Member having the services of a third electorate officer for the full 4th year until the election. Such an approach undermines the spirit and the intent of providing the Additional Staff Allocation and is not supported.

Professional Development

Submissions received sought the creation of a new entitlement to provide financial support for the professional development of Members. This would cover course/lecture/conference fees and

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associated travel and accommodation costs. It was suggested that the Presiding officers would authorise relevant professional development courses.

The Tribunal has considered this matter previously and continues to hold the view that the professional development of Members is a matter for the Legislature. In the meantime, Members should meet these costs from the Electoral Allowance.

Resettlement Allowance for Members not eligible to receive pension or superannuation benefits

In 2009 the Tribunal received submissions seeking the introduction of a "relocation allowance" similar to the one introduced for Federal Members of Parliament in 2007 by the Commonwealth Remuneration Tribunal. The Tribunal rejected those submissions, stating:

"the Act does not provide the Tribunal with authority to make determinations applicable to former Members. Without expressing a view on the merits of a 'resettlement' type allowance for members, the Act would need to be amended to allow the Tribunal to make a determination on this matter."

The Tribunal has again received a submission from the Presiding Officers seeking a Resettlement Allowance similar to that provided to Federal Members.

The Tribunal would require a detailed submission from the Presiding Officers on this matter before giving further consideration to this claim.

Committee Allowance

The Tribunal received submissions seeking confirmation that a Member elected as Chair of more than one Joint, Select or Standing Committee may claim the Committee Allowance in respect of each.

The Tribunal has also received a submission seeking the Committee Allowance payable to Members of the Public Accounts Committee be extended to all Members of committees in recognition of the additional workload.

The issue of the payment of additional allowances for Members who hold two or more offices is set out at section 6(3) of the Act which provides,

"...A person who holds 2 or more of the offices specified in Schedule 1 is entitled to the remuneration under this section that is applicable to only one of them, whichever has the greater or greatest such remuneration."

Clearly Members can only receive one allowance no matter how many offices they hold.

The extension of the Committee Allowance currently paid only to members of the Public Accounts Committee to be paid to all Committees is also not supported.

The purpose of the Allowance is to remunerate Members serving as Chairpersons on Committees for the extra time and effort required to carry out this role. Unlike other Committees, the Members of the Public Accounts Committee have also received an Allowance in view of its statutory nature and the scope and importance of its activities. No cogent case has been presented to the Tribunal for the need to extend these existing arrangements for Members of other Committees.

In terms of the quantum of Committee Allowances, it should be noted that historically this Allowance has been increased in line with Members' salary increases.

Member's salaries were increased from 1 October 2009 by 3.0 percent. In accordance with normal practice, therefore, the Committee Allowance will be increased by 3.0 percent.

Electorate Mail-out Account (EMA)

The EMA has been adjusted to reflect enrolment statistics as at March 2010. These are outlined in Schedule 4 of the Determination.

Constituent Communication Entitlement

The Tribunal received submissions seeking to expand the use of the Electorate Mailout Account to allow Members of the Legislative Assembly to develop and host websites to communicate with their constituents. Figures provided by Parliament reveal that Members of both Houses currently have websites and that some of these claim the costs of developing and hosting from the Logistic Support Allocation (LSA).

The Tribunal recognises the benefits of a website to inform constituents of community issues. The Tribunal does not, however, support the extension of the Electorate Mailout Account for this purpose at this time. It should be noted that within the LSA, Members are provided with funds for electronic and non-electronic communication. Quite appropriately, nearly a quarter of Members are paying for these websites from the LSA.

The Tribunal is not convinced that a new entitlement is warranted for this purpose. Once again while some Members may wish to develop and host websites others may not wish to do so. There is sufficient flexibility and funding available to Members for this purpose. An alternative source of funding for such purposes would be, in the Tribunal's view, using the Members' Electoral Allowance.

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There will however be an ongoing and ever increasing demand for Members to communicate with their constituents in more flexible forms such as the internet. The Tribunal would be prepared to consider such an arrangement for all Members of Parliament. Any such arrangement would have cost implications and the Tribunal would need to explore all options to ensure minimum impact on the public purse. The Tribunal would also need to consider what guidelines should be put in place to ensure proper content for members' websites.

Home Office Allowance

The Tribunal has received a submission seeking the creation of a separate "Home Office Allocation" to accommodate the purchase of office furniture and equipment in the various locations where a Member may be required to perform his/her parliamentary duties. The submission seeks an Allowance of \$2,500 for each Member to be paid at the commencement of each parliamentary term.

This proposal is considered impractical and is not supported. Members are provided with offices in Parliament (LA and LC) in the Electorate (LA Members). Equipment is also provided at the residence of all Members. In addition, Members can purchase laptops and mobile phones from their LSA.

On this basis, the Tribunal considers that Members have sufficient office equipment to meet all their needs and further office allocations beyond those provided are unnecessary.

THE PARLIAMENTARY REMUNERATION TRIBUNAL

The Determination of the Parliamentary Remuneration Tribunal

The Determination

Pursuant to section 10(2) and 11(1) of the Parliamentary Remuneration Act 1989 ("the Act"), the Tribunal makes the Determination appearing hereunder.

With effect on and from 1 July 2010, and pursuant to section 10(6) of the Act, all previous Determinations of the Tribunal are revoked. This Determination shall constitute the annual Determination and shall operate on and from 1 July 2010.

Definitions

"Member" or "Members" refers to a duly elected Member or Members of the Parliament of New South Wales (referred to hereinafter in this Determination as "the Parliament").

In this Determination the expression "additional entitlements" is to be understood in the sense used in Part 3 of the Act.

"Parliamentary duties" has the meaning attributed to it by section 3 of the Act,

"Electoral groups" are the groups of electorates specified in Schedule 1.

For the purpose of the Logistic Support Allocation for Members of the Legislative Council, "Zones" shall be those areas described in Schedule 2A.

"Approved relative" is a person who meets one of the following criteria:

- Wife or husband of the Member
- A person living in a domestic relationship as defined in the Property Partner (Relationships) Act 1984
- Single or widowed Members may nominate a Member of their immediate family (parents, siblings, children who are not minors i.e. below 16 years of age) as an approved relative.

Under special circumstances a Member may apply through the Presiding Officers to the Tribunal for an exception to the criteria. This will need to be based on the ability of the Member to meet their parliamentary duties and individual circumstances that apply at the time.

Guidelines and General Conditions Regarding Additional Entitlements for Members in Connection with Parliamentary Duties

1. Guidelines

Every class of "additional entitlements" described in this Determination is provided pursuant to section 10(1)(a) of the Act "for the purpose of facilitating the efficient performance of the Parliamentary duties of Members." The following guidelines shall apply to the receipt, use and operation of additional entitlements **(excluding Electoral Allowance)**.

- 1 Circumstances upon which the additional entitlements may be used for Parliamentary Duties.
 - 1.1 Additional entitlements are provided to facilitate the efficient performance of the following particular Parliamentary duties of Members as follows:
 - 1.1.1 Activities undertaken in representing the interests of constituents, but excluding activities of a direct electioneering or political campaigning nature.
 - 1.1.2 Performing electorate work for a Member's electorate and participation in official and community activities to which the Member is invited because of the Member's status as a Parliamentary representative.
 - 1.1.3 Attending and participating in sessions of Parliament.
 - 1.1.4 Participation in the activities of Parliamentary committees.
 - 1.1.5 Attending Vice-Regal, Parliamentary and State ceremonial functions.
 - 1.1.6 Attending State, Commonwealth and Local Government functions.
 - 1.1.7 Attending official functions to which a Member is invited because of the Member's status as a Parliamentary representative, e.g., receptions and other community gatherings hosted by Members of the diplomatic corps, educational and religious institutions, community and service organisations, business associations, sporting bodies or other special interest groups.
 - 1.1.8 Participation in the activities of recognised political parties, including participation in national, State and regional conferences, branch meetings, electorate council meetings, executive meetings, committee meetings, and meetings of the Members of the Parliamentary political party, its executive and committees.

- 1.1.9 For a Member elected to the Parliament as an independent, participation in activities that are reasonable alternatives to participation in the activities of recognised political parties.
- 1.1.10 A Member who is elected to the Parliament as a representative of a recognised political party and who subsequently resigns from that party Membership and thereafter sits as an independent Member, howsoever described, shall continue to receive the same entitlements as they received as a Member of the party prior to resignation and not the additional entitlements provided to elected independents. The Member is also not entitled to the benefit of the rule in Clause 1.1.9 above.
- 1.1.11 Participation within Australia in the activities of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA) as well as activities outside Australia (exclusive of air travel) organised by the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association provided such activities arise directly from Membership of the New South Wales Branch and officially endorsed by the Branch. Members may utilise Frequent Flyer Points which have been accrued as a result of the use of public funds to purchase international flights or obtain an upgrade in seat class in order to attend CPA activities.
- 1.1.12 Participation in a Parliamentary Group such as the Asia Pacific Friendship Group; provided that, such group is approved in writing by the President of the Legislative Council and the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly.
- 2 Where any additional entitlement fixed by this Determination is to be used for the purpose of facilitating Members' participation in the activities of recognised political parties, the Tribunal sets out the following guidelines as to the use of that additional entitlement:
 - 2.1 Parties registered under the *Parliamentary Electorates and Elections Act 1912*, and included in the register of parties maintained by the Electoral Commissioner, are to be treated as recognised political parties.
 - 2.2 Additional entitlements should not be used to fund:
 - 2.2.1 activities such as those associated with party Membership drives;
 - 2.2.2 mail distributions for non-electorate or non-Parliamentary activities;

3.3 In the case of a Member's activities within the broader community outside the Member's electorate, activities that may reasonably be regarded as deriving from the Member's status as a Parliamentary representative should be treated as Parliamentary duties.

2. Conditions

The following general conditions will apply to all additional entitlements determined hereunder. These conditions are in addition to any special conditions attaching to the provision of allowances or other benefits (as specified later in this Determination):

1 All procurement by Members will be in accordance with the Parliament's purchasing policies.

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- 2 Members must ensure that they have sufficient funds to meet the costs associated with their Parliamentary duties.
- 3 Each Member shall have, in addition to payments of the Electoral and Sydney Allowance, an account entitled the "Logistic Support Allocation" which shall cover expenditure in the areas of transport (except for electorate to Sydney travel), communications, printing, stationery and office supplies and other purposes related to a Member's Parliamentary duties not specifically excluded by the Parliamentary Remuneration Tribunal, the Parliament's administration or taxation ruling TR99/10.
- The Logistic Support Allocation shall be established and maintained by the Executive Manager,
 Department of Parliamentary Services. Members should be advised by the Department of
 Parliamentary Services each month as to the balance of their Logistic Support Allocation.
- 5 Nothing shall prevent the use of the Electoral Allowance for legitimate electorate expenses which might also fall within the categories of expenses covered by the Logistic Support Allocation.
- 6 All accounts and Members' claims must be submitted to the Legislature for payment within 60 days of receipt or occurrence of the expense.
- 7 All Members' additional entitlements in the nature of fixed allocations and Sydney allowance provided to Members shall be audited annually for compliance. In addition to any internal audit conducted by the Parliament, Members' additional entitlements in the nature of fixed allocations and the Sydney allowance provided to Members shall be the subject of an external audit conducted by the Auditor-General of NSW. The cost of any audit shall be met by the Parliament. Members should ensure they maintain appropriate records of expenditure for the purpose of any audit.
- 8 Expenditure is only to be incurred in connection with the Parliamentary duties of Members (and in this respect the Member should refer to the guidelines in this Determination and those issued by the Parliament).
- 9 The various allowances determined here, as well as the Logistic Support Allocation are for the sole use of the Member and are not to be transferred to other persons or organisations including Members. The Member may use his/her entitlements to meet official costs of the

approved relative and/or staff employed by the Parliament when that expenditure is in connection with official Parliamentary duties.

- 10 Benefits accrued by a Member by way of loyalty/incentive schemes such as frequent flyers, as a consequence of the Member using his or her additional entitlements, are to be used only for Parliamentary duties and not for private purposes. Any outstanding benefits of this nature, when the Member ceases to be a Member, are to be forfeited. Members shall be required to complete an annual declaration form provided by the Parliament's administration at the end of each financial year or within 30 days of ceasing to be a Member declaring that they have not used loyalty/reward benefits accrued through the use of their additional entitlements for non-Parliamentary or electorate purposes.
- 11 Payment of accounts relating to the use of a Member's additional entitlements in the nature of fixed allocations will be paid directly by the Parliament and debited to the Member's account or paid in the first instance by the Member who would then seek reimbursement from the Parliament.

Additional Entitlements in the Nature of Allowances

1. Electoral Allowance

The allowance is based upon those factors which have historically been taken into account in assessing the quantum of the allowance (including the additional costs associated with the performance by Members of their Parliamentary duties in their electorates) and such other factors as may be determined from time to time as appropriate to be taken into account by the Tribunal under the Act.

Entitlement

The allowances shall be paid as follows:

1 Each Member of the Legislative Assembly and the Legislative Council shall receive an electoral allowance. The quantum of that allowance shall be fixed in accordance with the electoral grouping for the electorate of the Member. 2 The allowance payable per annum for each electorate group shall be as follows:

- 3 The electoral allowance for each Member of the Legislative Council shall be \$48,140 per annum.
- 4 The allowance shall be payable calendar monthly in arrears in conjunction with salary payments.

2. Sydney Allowance

Purpose and Operation of the Provisions

The Sydney Allowance is provided to Members who reside in non-metropolitan electorates to compensate for the additional costs including commercial accommodation, meals and incidental costs associated with staying in Sydney to attend sessions of Parliament, meetings of Parliamentary committees or other Parliamentary business.

For the purpose of this Allowance the non-metropolitan electorates (Electorate Groups 2-8) have been divided into two categories based on distance from Sydney. Members whose principal place of residence is in either Category 1 or Category 2 electorates, as specified in Schedule 2, are eligible to receive the Sydney Allowance.

The Tribunal considers the Member's principal place of residence to be that residence where the Member would normally return and reside when not attending Sydney on parliamentary duties.

To establish the principal place of residence each Member will be required to complete the Parliament's checklist and certify that the residence nominated is the principal place of residence.

Entitlement

The daily rate (including the number of overnight stays) for the Sydney Allowance for Categories 1 and 2 shall be in accordance with Table 1 below. Where a Member elects for a daily rate, he/she shall be entitled to the daily rate for the number of overnight stays per annum specified in that Table, except as provided in condition 5.

The following conditions apply to the Sydney Allowance:

- 1 A Member can choose to receive the Sydney Allowance as either an annual fixed allowance or a daily rate. The election is to be made at the commencement of each financial year.
- If a Member chooses to receive the annual fixed allowance the Financial Controller of the Legislature will calculate the annual entitlement by multiplying the number of overnight stays for the particular Member or Recognised Office Holder by the daily rate.
- In order to receive the Allowance each Member must certify to the Executive Manager,
 Department of Parliamentary Services their principal place of residence.
- Where a Member chooses to receive the daily rate of allowance the Member shall receive the overnight daily rate as specified in Table 1. The Member is entitled to the number of overnight stays per annum specified in Table 1 without the need to substantiate to the Parliament expenses up to the daily rate.

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- 5 Where a Member chooses to receive the daily rate of allowance and the Member exceeds the number of overnight stays Members will be reimbursed actual costs, up to the daily maximum upon the production of tax invoices/receipts for each such occasion.
- 6 Members in receipt of the Sydney Allowance when travelling to Sydney for parliamentary business or home from Sydney and where there is no overnight stay required en-route will be entitled to reasonable actual expenses to the maximum provided in the "In transit...." Column of Table 1 above. This rate is only applied when the Member is travelling to Sydney or travelling home from Sydney following an overnight stay. Members may not claim the in transit allowance if they have exceeded the allocated number of overnight stays applicable for receipt of the Sydney Allowance.
- 7 When in receipt of the annual allowance Members are required to certify at the end of the financial year the number of occasions they stayed in Sydney and that on each occasion the stay was for Parliamentary business. Members who nominate to receive the annual allowance cannot claim for additional overnight stays in excess of those specified in Table 1.
- 8 Members are required to maintain records or other relevant proof that clearly document the occasions they stayed in Sydney in connection with their Parliamentary duties. Subject to the proviso below, Members attending Parliament House on Parliamentary business when Parliament is not sitting are required to sign in and out of the Parliamentary Register as proof of being in Sydney. On those occasions where Members are in Sydney on parliamentary business but are not required to attend Parliament House e.g., attending a function, then the Member must provide sufficient proof to the Executive Manager to substantiate each such occasion. Provided, however, it will be sufficient for Members to provide entries from their diaries, or other forms of documentary proof, acceptable to the Executive Manager to certify as proof of their attendance in Sydney.
- 9 Members in receipt of the annual amount will be required to provide their annual reconciliation for payments made in the previous financial year and, if applicable, return to Parliament any part of the annual amount that they have not substantiated by 30 September each year or within 30 days of ceasing to be a Member.
- 10 Members who do not reimburse outstanding amounts by 30 September each year are to have their annual entitlement suspended and are to revert to the daily rate of Sydney Allowance until the reimbursement is made.

11 Members are not to claim the Sydney Allowance if they stay in Government owned or funded accommodation including Parliament House.

3. Committee Allowances

Purpose and Operation of the Provision

Committee Allowances are paid to Chairpersons of Joint, Select and Standing Committees in recognition of the additional responsibilities of the office. Because of the statutory nature of the Public Accounts Committee and their role in Government activities, annual rate of allowance is payable to Members of these Committees.

Entitlement

Members of the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly serving as Chairpersons of Joint Committees, Select Committees and Standing Committees shall be paid the sum of \$175.00 for each day upon which they attend a meeting or an official visit of inspection if that day is one upon which the Legislative Council (so far as a Member of the Council is concerned) or the Legislative Assembly (so far as a Member of the Assembly is concerned) is not sitting. This allowance is not payable to Chairpersons in receipt of a salary of office as specified in Schedule 1 of the *Parliamentary Remuneration Act 1989*.

Members of the Public Accounts Committee, other than the Chairperson of the Committee or another Committee in receipt of a salary of office as specified in schedule 1 of the Parliamentary Remuneration Act 1989, shall each receive a committee allowance of \$4,010 per annum.

Additional Entitlements in the Nature of Fixed Allocations

1. Electorate to Sydney Travel

Purpose and Operation of the Provisions

Members of the Legislative Assembly who reside in electorate groups 2 to 7 and Members of the Legislative Council who reside in zones 2 or 3 qualify for return air travel warrants between their electorates/zones and Sydney.

These entitlements are provided for the performance of Parliamentary duties.

All eligible Members shall receive one hundred and four (104) single economy class journeys per annum between electorate/zone and Sydney.

Where eligible, each of the below mentioned recognised office holders shall be entitled to the following additional electorate to Sydney travel entitlements per annum.

Deputy Leader of Party (not less than 10 Members in the Legislative Assembly)	16 single journey entitlements

Conditions

- 1 All electorate to Sydney travel and return is restricted to economy class.
- 2 Entitlements may be used to meet the cost of using a private motor vehicle or rental vehicle in lieu of electorate to Sydney air travel. The amount to be reimbursed for this purpose is not to exceed the commercial airfare for an equivalent distance flight.
- 3 A minimum of one_entitlement is required to be surrendered for each single journey; a return trip will require the surrender of at least two warrants.
- 4 Entitlements are not transferable between Members, or approved relatives, or Members' staff.
- 5 Members may use electorate to Sydney entitlements to defray part of the cost of intrastate and interstate Parliamentary travel when such travel is via Sydney.
- 6 Members may charter a plane in lieu of travelling on commercial flights provided that travel is for electorate and/or Parliamentary business and that sufficient entitlements based on the equivalent commercial cost of each person travelling are surrendered. The cost of Member's approved relative travelling on the charter is to be met from the Member's Logistic Support

Allocation. It is a condition of all air transport charters that the Member responsible for organising the charter obtains a passenger manifest from the charter operator and attaches it to the invoice when it is sent for payment.

- 7 A Member's air transport booking for Parliamentary duties and that of their spouse/approved relative and staff are to be made by the Member with an appropriate transport provider.
- 8 Members will need to maintain records or other relevant evidence that clearly document the occasions they travelled to Sydney in connection with their Parliamentary duties. A copy of this documentation including airline boarding passes if travelling by commercial air is to be retained for subsequent review by internal and/or external auditors if required.

2. Logistic Support Allocation

Purpose and Operation of the Provision

The purpose of the Logistic Support Allocation is to provide Members with sufficient funds to cover the operational costs of undertaking their Parliamentary duties.

The items in respect of which the LSA may be used must not duplicate services already provided to Members by the Parliament and the expenditure must be consistent with the Determination and in accordance with General Condition 3 on page 17 of this Determination.

Entitlement

Each Member and Recognised Office Holder of the Legislative Assembly who resides in one of the following electorate groups will be entitled to an annual allocation for the Logistic Support Allocation as follows:

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Each Member and Recognised Office Holder of the Legislative Council who resides in one of the following zones will be entitled to an annual allocation for the Logistic Support Allocation as follows:

Recognised Office Holders are entitled to further additional entitlements as specified in Schedule 3

General Conditions

The following general conditions shall apply to the Logistic Support Allocation Account:

- 1 The Department of Parliamentary Services shall be available to assist Members in selfassessing that use of their LSA is consistent with this Determination. Assistance provided shall be in the form of an advisory service and will include the provision of information and guidelines that have regard to taxation, accounting and funding implications. This advice shall not abrogate Members from their responsibilities under General Guidelines 3.1 on page 17 and other provisions of this Determination.
- 2 Subject to these conditions, each Member shall determine at his/her own discretion the use of the funds within this Account for the purpose and operations specified above.
- 3 It is the primary responsibility of Members to ensure that they manage their Logistic Support Allocation Account to ensure that they do not over-expend their budget. The Tribunal will not provide for supplementation of this Allocation. However, the Logistic Support Allocation is not intended to restrict the proper use of the Electoral Allowance.
- 4 Members may not use their Logistic Support Allocation to procure goods or services to be used for direct electioneering purposes or political campaigning.
- 5 Any unused Logistic Support Allocation remaining in the Members' account at the end of the financial year within the four year Parliamentary term shall be carried over to the following financial year. At the end of each four year term or the earlier dissolution of the Legislative Assembly, any unused Logistic Support Allocations are forfeited.
- 6 Members must personally authorise expenditure from their Logistic Support Allocation. Whilst subject to both the general and particular conditions, together with the Parliament's administrative guidelines Members may determine at their discretion use of the LSA available for any purpose and operation provided the total allocation is not exceeded. The following

table outlines the basis upon which the Tribunal has established the quantum of the account for future assessment. The table shall also be used for particular purposes such as the calculation of additional entitlements for Recognised Office Holders.

Particular Conditions

Transport (Other than Electorate or Electorate to Sydney transport)

- 1 A Member may use any form of transport within Australia subject to the requirement that the transport was used for Parliamentary or electorate duties and that the cost was reasonable.
- 2 A Member may travel to any place in Australia, subject to the requirement that all such travel must be for Parliamentary duties and that there must be, at the time of the making of the relevant reservation, sufficient funds in that Member's Account to pay for the expenses involved.
- 3 All transport costs associated with approved relative or Members' staff travel (excluding travel costs associated with staff training) are to be provided from the Logistic Support Allocation Account. Staff training costs are to be met by the Legislature.

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- 4 Members and their approved relatives, when travelling in connection with the Member's Parliamentary duties, may claim reasonable actual accommodation and meal expenses from the Member's Logistic Support Allocation. The reimbursement of these expenses may not exceed the travel allowance rates as determined for Group 2 in Table 2 hereunder. Staff employed by the Parliament who travel with their Member or separately for Parliamentary business purposes may be paid travel allowances in accordance with appropriate Public Service Award conditions.
- 5 A Member and his or her approved relative may travel together or separately in connection with attendance at a function in the course of Parliamentary duties.
- 6 A Member, his or her approved relative and staff employed by the Parliament, may use taxis or hire cars for Parliamentary duties.
- 7 A Member's air transport booking for Parliamentary duties and that of their spouse/approved relative and staff are to be made by the Member with an appropriate transport provider.
- 8 Members should ensure that records are maintained that clearly document the occasions that staff employed by the Parliament stayed in Sydney or other locations when travelling in connection with the Member's Parliamentary duties. Such documentation including airline boarding passes if applicable is to be retained for subsequent review by internal and external auditors if required.
- 9 A Member may use charter transport in connection with Parliamentary duties, but only within the limits of the Member's individual Logistic Support Allocation. No passenger, except the Member's approved relative and staff employed by the Parliament accompanying the Member on Parliamentary duties, may be carried at the cost of the Member's Logistic Support Allocation entitlement. Where more than one Member is travelling on the air charter, the total air charter costs should be shared equally between the Members travelling.
- 10 It is a condition of all air transport charters that the Member responsible for organising the charter obtain a passenger manifest from the charter operator and attach it to the invoice when it is submitted for payment to the Legislature.
- 11 Members together with their approved relative will need to maintain records or other relevant evidence that clearly document the occasions they travelled in connection with their Parliamentary duties. A copy of this documentation including airline boarding passes if

travelling by commercial air flights is to be retained for subsequent review by internal and external auditors if required.

Communication – electronic

- 1 The Tribunal accepts that there will be some private usage in connection with mobile telephones supplied by the Parliament and electronic communication equipment installed at public expense in a Member's principal place of residence. To ensure the Legislature does not pay Fringe Benefits Tax for the private usage of electronic equipment, the Financial Controller will undertake a survey over an appropriate period of time to ascertain public/private percentage use of Members' home telecommunication services. Once established, Members will be reimbursed the Parliamentary business cost of each home telecommunication call or usage account and an adjustment shall be made to previous accounts reimbursed from the effective date of this Determination on or from the date of election, whichever is the later.
- 2 Members may utilise any telecommunication services or network features with the exception of overseas calls, charged information/service calls, reverse charge calls, home-link calls and Telecard calls.
- 3 The following Recognised Office Holders shall be entitled to 100 per cent reimbursement for electronic-communication costs.
 - Ministers
 - Presiding Officers
 - Leader of the Opposition (Assembly and Council)
 - Leader of a Party not less than 10 Members in the Legislative Assembly
 - Deputy Speaker
 - Deputy President and Chair of Committees, Legislative Council
 - Assistant Speaker, Legislative Assembly
 - Deputy Leader of the Opposition (Assembly and Council)
 - Deputy Leader of a Party with not less than 10 Members in the Legislative Assembly
 - Parliamentary Secretaries (Assembly and Council)
 - Government and Opposition Whips (Assembly and Council)
 - Whip of a third party with not less than 10 Members (Legislative Assembly)
 - Deputy Whips (Legislative Assembly).

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- 4 Call charges pertaining to a data line installed at Legislative Council Members' home offices be reimbursed at the rate of 100 per cent where Members do not have a broadband service connected, subject to the line being used for Parliamentary duties.
- 5 Members will be required to meet the cost of all overseas calls, other charged information/service calls, reverse charge calls and home-link and Telecard calls.
- 6 Members are to meet the cost of their portable communication equipment and the associated operating costs from the Logistic Support Allocation. The purchase of such items is to be in accordance with the Parliament's procurement policies and administrative guidelines.

Communication – non-electronic

Members are permitted to purchase postage stamps or other mail distribution and delivery services to enable them to undertake their Parliamentary duties.

Printing, Stationery, Office Supplies and Services

- 1 Members may only use the printing, stationery, office supplies and services entitlement for Parliamentary duties.
- 2 The entitlement may be used to purchase printing, stationery, office supplies and services from the Parliament or other providers and in accordance with Parliamentary procurement policies and practices.
- 3 A Member may not use their printing, stationery, office supplies and services allowances to procure goods or services to be used for direct electioneering purposes or political campaigning.
- 4 The purchase of computer software from the Logistic Support Allocation is subject to the following conditions:
 - The software will not be supported by the Parliament's I.T. Section.
 - The software is required to be removed from the computers supplied by the Parliament if there is any conflict with the Parliament's computer network.
 - The software is not to be used for political campaigning or electioneering purposes.
 - 5 Members may use the entitlement to engage a suitably qualified independent professional to manage their financial record keeping to monitor their use of their

additional entitlements in the form of fixed allocations to ensure they do not exceed their entitlements. These services are not to be used for any other purpose including the preparation of the Member's tax return.

3. Electorate Mailout Account

Each Member of the Legislative Assembly will be provided with an amount as specified in the attached Schedule for the following specific purposes:

- A. For preparing and distributing letters/newsletters to each constituent in his/her electorate. Members are provided with an annual amount based on the cost of issuing two newsletters/letters per enrolled voter per annum. Members may issue additional newsletters/letters subject to available funds in their Electorate Mail-Out Account and the Legislative Assembly's administrative guidelines.
- B. Upon the gazettal of new electoral districts following an electoral redistribution (undertaken pursuant to s 27(1)(c) of the *Constitution Act 1902*), Members may use their Electorate Mailout Account to communicate with prospective constituents from neighbouring electorates who at the time of the next election following the gazettal of the new electoral districts will become constituents of the Member's electorate.

Conditions

- 1 The Electorate Mailout Account shall be established and maintained by the Executive Manager Department of Parliamentary Services. Members should be advised by the Department of Parliamentary Services each month as to the balance of their Account.
- 2 Members are to fund the cost of preparing, printing and distributing letters/Newsletters to each constituent in his/her electorate and for no other purpose.
- 3 All procurement by Members will be in accordance with the Parliament's purchasing policies.
- 4 No supplementation to the allocation will be considered. Any additional costs are to be met from the Member's Logistic Support Allocation.
- 5 Unused Electorate Mail-out Account allocations are to be forfeited at the end of each financial year.
- 6 Printing and distribution of newsletters/letters from the Electorate Mailout Account is to be in accordance with the Parliament's administrative guidelines.

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- 7 Communication with prospective constituents following gazettal of electoral districts will be limited only to those electors who will transfer from adjoining electorates to the new electorate. Each Member is to receive the details of the prospective constituents from the State Electoral Office.
- 8 Communications with constituents/prospective constituents will be limited to matters affecting the Member's electorate.

4. Electorate Charter Transport for Members of the Legislative Assembly

Purpose and operation of the provision

Members of the largest electorates (Electoral Groups 5-8) shall be provided with an allowance from which is met charter transport costs incurred within their electorates. For the purposes of this allowance "charter transport" means charter transport used with and for the service of the Member's electorate and includes charter aircraft, drive yourself vehicles and any other mode of charter transport that may be deemed appropriate in the circumstances by the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly.

Entitlement

Members of the Legislative Assembly in the following Electorate Groups shall be entitled to Charter Transport Allowance up to the maximum amount shown below:

Conditions

The following conditions shall apply in respect of Charter Transport Allowance:

- 1 This Allowance shall only be used in connection with Parliamentary duties within the Member's electorate and shall not be used during election campaigns or for other electioneering or party political activities. For the purpose of this condition the last day available for the issue of the writs shall be used as the effective commencement date of the election campaign.
- 2 Only the cost of the Member's approved relative or Member of staff accompanying the Member may be met from this Allowance.

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- 3 It is a condition of all air transport charters that the Member responsible for organising the charter obtains a passenger manifest from the charter operator and attaches it to the invoice when it is submitted for payment to the Parliament.
- 4 The charter transport shall only be used within and for the service of the Member's electorate. Where the closest source of available charter transport to the Member's electorate, electorate office or principal place of residence is outside the boundaries of the electorate, the reasonable additional expenses consequently incurred may be included in the reimbursement available under this Determination.
- 5 Members may use their Charter Transport Allowance to fly to an airfield located outside their electorate in circumstances where there is no suitable airfield located in the part of the electorate being visited by the Member. In these circumstances the Member would fly to the relevant airfield outside his/her electorate and then drive back to the electorate to conduct electorate business.
- 6 Members may also use the Charter Transport Allowance to attend regional or other meetings within an adjoining electorate relating to matters affecting their electorate. Members will need to maintain and retain records to verify that the purpose of the journey relates to electorate business for subsequent audit review if required.
- 7 A Member representing the Electorate of Murray Darling and a Member representing the Electorate of Barwon who flies his/her own aircraft, may claim reimbursement against this allowance for the cost of fuel and landing fees.
- 8 These additional entitlements shall be audited annually for compliance. In addition to any internal audit conducted by the Parliament, Members' additional entitlements shall be the subject of an external audit conducted by the Auditor-General of NSW. The cost of any auditing shall be met by the Parliament. Members should ensure they maintain appropriate records of expenditure.

Leader and Deputy Leader of a Recognised Political Party of which not less then ten Members are Members of the Legislative Assembly,

Government and Opposition Whips,

Deputy Government and Deputy Opposition Whips,

Parliamentary Secretary,

Whip in the Legislative Assembly of a recognised political party, not fewer than 10 Members of whom are Members of the Legislative Assembly,

Deputy Whip in the Legislative Assembly of a recognised political party, not fewer than 40 Members of which are Members of the Legislative Assembly,

Members of Select, Joint Standing, Standing and Public Accounts Committees.

The following conditions shall apply in respect of this allowance:

- 1 Recognised Office Holders are to be reimbursed travelling expenses when travel is undertaken in association with their role as a Recognised Office Holder only. These allowances will not apply when a Member travels on Parliamentary business in their own capacity.
- 2 Recognised Office Holders are eligible to claim reasonable actual travelling expenses for overnight absences from Sydney or their electorate/principal home residence. Where no overnight absence is involved Recognised Office Holders may claim reasonable actual meal expenses. Indicative upper limits for travel expenditure are outlined in Table 2.
- 3 The payment of actual travelling expenses will be paid subject to the production of tax invoices/receipts relating to accommodation, meal and other incidental expenses by the Recognised Office Holder concerned.
- 4 A Recognised Office Holder whose approved relative accompanies him or her to a State or other official function and who consequently incurs expenses in respect of meals and accommodation exceeding the allowance to which he or she is entitled, shall be entitled to be reimbursed the additional expenses associated with the approved relative.
- 5 Those Recognised Office Holders for whom non-Parliamentary funded budgets are provided are to meet travel allowance costs from those budgets and not from the Parliament.

6. Equipment, Services and Facilities

Members of the Legislative Assembly and the Legislative Council shall be provided by the Parliament with the equipment, services and facilities necessary to perform their Parliamentary duties as follows:

- 1 All Members shall receive at Parliament House, Sydney, a fitted out, equipped and maintained office, and secretarial services.
- 2 Each Member of the Legislative Assembly shall receive a fitted out, equipped and maintained Electorate Office to an appropriate standard. The Member for Murray-Darling and the Member for Barwon is to be provided with an additional electorate office.

- 3 Each Member shall be supplied equipment and ancillary services in the Member's private residence (or if the Member has more than one private residence then in the Member's principal private residence) including a telephone and a facsimile machine, for the performance by the Member of Parliamentary duties.
- 4 The Presiding Officers are to provide administrative support to each Member in accordance with the following:
 - i. Subject to (ii), each Member of the Legislative Assembly shall have two staff Members employed at each electoral office.
 - ii. Each Member of the Legislative Assembly elected as an Independent shall have an additional staff Member employed at his/her electoral office.
 - iii. Each Member of the Legislative Assembly, not elected as an Independent, shall be provided with a budget specific for the recruitment of temporary staff. The budget is to provide for an additional staff Member to work in the electorate office or at Parliament House. The budget is to be the equivalent of the salary of an electorate officer grade 2 for a period of 61 days per annum. Within this budget, Members have the flexibility to use this entitlement to employ additional staff.
 - iv. Each Member of the Legislative Council, who is not a Minister, shall be entitled to one staff Member. When the staff Member is on annual recreation leave or other extended period of leave, a relief staff Member may be employed for the period of absence.
 - v. Each Member of the Legislative Council, who is not a Minister, and who is elected as a cross bench Member shall be entitled to two staff Members.
 - vi. Ministers shall receive a reasonable allocation of staff Members.
 - vii. The Whip of each recognised political party of not less than 10 Members to each be provided with one Member of staff.
 - viii. This provision specifies the minimum staffing required in electorate offices. Nothing in this Determination removes from the employer of staff the obligations arising under the Occupational Health and Safety Act 2000.

Advice of the Secretary of NSW Treasury Pursuant to Section 12A of the Parliamentary Remuneration Act, 1989

The following comments on the Parliamentary Remuneration Tribunal's 2010 annual Determination are made pursuant to Section 12A of the *Parliamentary Remuneration Act, 1989* by the Secretary of the Treasury.

Financial Implications

The table below shows the variation in entitlements over the 2009 Determination. For the purpose of calculating costs, the estimates are based on the 2009 composition of the Legislative Assembly and the Council membership.

Estimates have not been provided where the maximum remuneration limits for the particular allowances are not defined (ie. Travelling Allowance for Recognised Office Holders). The Sydney Allowance is calculated on the annual amount allocated to Members.

Member entitlements have increased by \$359,416 over the 2009 Determination, which represents a rise of about 1.9 per cent.

The increase in Electoral Allowance, Sydney Allowance and Logistic Support Allocation of 2.9 per cent is in line with the CPI increase for the period March 2009 to March 2010.

The rates for calculating the Electorate Mailout Account (EMA) have not changed since 2009 and remains at 65 cents per mail. However there is a minor reduction to the total cost due to a lower number of electors as of March 2010.

There is no estimate for the Travel Allowance for Recognised Office Holders, the Allowance rate vary depending on travel destination.

I advise that the financial implications of the proposed variation in entitlements in the 2010 Determination can be managed within existing funding arrangements.

Accountability and Control

I note that additional guidelines have been set by the Parliamentary Remuneration Tribunal to ensure greater accountability and control over the use of entitlements by Members.
